THE SYNOD OF HURON

The Anglican Synod at London has just closed its forty-sixth annual session. As might have been expected from the past awakening in the church, the spirit of missions prevailed and one and all showed a disposition to meet to the last dollar and the last man the urgent demands in our Northwest for the ministrations of the church to the thousands who are immigrating to that country. The Diocese of Huron is responding splendidly for the call for support in the domestic and foreign mission fields.

His Lordship, the Bishop, gave special attention to two subjects—one, the urgent need in the spiritual work of help from the able men in every congregation, men who had become accustomed to use the Lord's Day for great yawn, and the other, the suppression of the gambling spirit which he said was bred and nourished in the homes of the rich where ladies darkened their rooms and lit the gas and wasted their precious time in practising this awful crime under the euphonious name of progressive euchre, and later their sons and daughters took the finishing course in the open gambling dens or bucket shops.

The ballots were opened on Thursday and so far as they affect the Chatham representatives show that the Rev. Rural Dean McCosh, His Honor Judge Woods and Matthew Wilson, K. C., were placed upon the Executive committee. Rev. Mr. McCosh and Mr. Wilson were chosen delegates from Huron to the Provincial Synod, and Mr. Wilson was elected also to the General Synod for all Canada. In addition to these elections Mr. Wilson was appointed a member of the Advisory Board to the Bishop on patronage, a representative on the General Board of Missions for Canada, a member of the Senate of the Western University, a Councillor for Huron University College, and a member of the committee for the arrangement of the affairs of local missions.

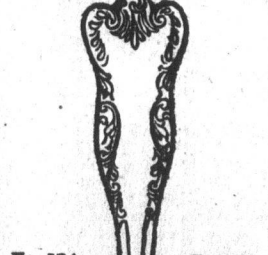

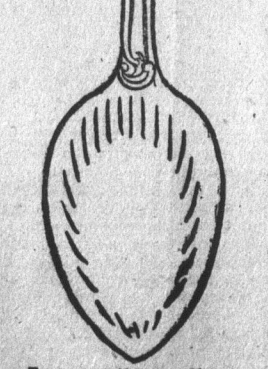
