Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

There was a general improvement in trade at St. Lawrence Ma. et to-day, the receipts in most lines being heavier. The total grain receipts amounted to 1,600 husbels.

Trade in all lines of cattle, with the exception of exporters, was fairly good at the Toronto Cattle Market to-day. The export business is practically dead, pending the settlement of the Mongreal strikes, but the movement in other cattle was fairly active. The run of hogs was inclined to be heavy, and prices dropped 25c per cwt.

The total receipts amounted to 74 cars, including 1.169 cattle, 222 sheep and lambs.

Calves—The run of calves was mederately large, but many of them were hardly fit for market. The demand at present is only for good stock, and others are not wanted. Quotations continue unchanged. Sheep and Lambs—Trade was good, and everything sold early. Prospects all round are about steady. Light butchers sheep of good quality are rather scarce and are in demand. They are quoted 25c per cwt firmer, and heavier are a little easier. Other quotations are about steady. Hogs—The run was rather heavier than the demand warranted, and prices are quoted 25c per cwt easier at \$6.25 per cwt for selects and \$6 for lights and fats.



HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

minion lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Territories, excepting & and 26, which has not been homesteaded or reserved to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

ENTRY

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the dist in which the land to be taken is situate, or if the homesteader desired he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate, receive authority for some one to make entry for him. A fee of \$10 is charged for a homestead entry.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES

Under the present law homestead duties must be performed in one of the following ways, namely:

(1) By at least six months' dence upon and cultivation of land in each year during the term of three years, or-

(2) If the father (or the mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of the law as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother, or-

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by himself in the vicinity of his homestead the requirements of the law as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT

Should be made at the end of ars before the Local A Sub-Agent or the Homestead Inspector. Before making application for patent the settler must give sin months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of his intention to do so.
