**BAPTISTS MET
HERE YESTERDAY**

Interesting Session of Ministers of Brant and Oxford Counties.

The Baptist ministers of Oxford and Brant Counties held their regular session yesterday at the Park Baptist church. There was a representative attendance of the men from the different Baptist churches in the county. The subject was modern preaching, and was very enthusiastically discussed. A great variety of views were expressed as to the kind of preaching needed to-day, and the kind of a preacher the modern pulpits demand.

The two papers of the day were presented by two brothers, Rev. Llewellyn Brown of the First Baptist church of this city, and Rev. Dougald Brown of Springfield.

In the first paper on modern preaching, Rev. Llewellyn Brown advanced the idea that the pulpit of to-day demands a different type of preaching than was demanded twenty-five years ago. One of the first conditions of success is that the man should understand the times in which he lives. This is preeminently true of preaching. The world outside of the church has not stood still, and if the pulpit stands still it will fail to minister to the needs of the times. Such a church fails, and is sure to miss the divine intention as to what a church ought to be in the life of a modern community. Three notes that need to be emphasized to-day in modern preaching are the ethical, the doctrinal and the passionate.

The second paper of the day was by Rev. D. Brown of Springfield, and dealt with the modern preacher. There are marked differences between the preacher of days gone by as to his method of approach to the people. The substance of the sermons preached to-day differs widely, both as to their

method and matter to the sermons of yesterday. The modern preacher who will succeed must be a man marked by simple honesty, by spirituality and by a first-hand knowledge of men and of the word of life.

**TUESDAY COURT
A HEAVY ONE**

There Are Eleven Civil and Two Criminal Cases Before Judge Hardy.

Eleven civil cases and two criminal comprise the list to date of cases to be heard at the general sessions of the peace, which open on Tuesday, before His Honor, Judge Hardy. Three civil cases have been filed since yesterday.

Non-Jury.
J. Malcolm and Son vs. Hamilton Dairy Co. Limited, N. A. Secord for the plaintiff; James and Slater for the defendant. The plaintiffs carry on business at St. George and the defendants are engaged in a general milk and ice cream business. The plaintiffs set out that there was an agreement by which the plaintiffs were to supply to the defendants cream and such cream as was to be delivered in cans owned by the plaintiffs, which cans were to be returned. The defence deny the existence of the agreement and set out that the defendants did not agree to be responsible for the return of the cans shipped, but that all the empty cans shipped to plaintiffs were at the plaintiffs' risk. The plaintiffs claim that 247 cans were not returned and ask for the payment of \$3.00 for each of these cans, also costs of the action.

Fred Corey vs. The Warren Bituminous Paving Co. of Ontario, Ltd., W. A. Hollinrake for the plaintiff; Robbinette, Godfrey and Pagan for the defendant. The plaintiff is a resident of this city and the defendants have their head office in Toronto, but have carried on business here. The plaintiff is suing for \$850 for the securing of signatures to a petition for the construction of pavement on Colborne St. between Alfred St. and Park Avenue, on Colborne St. between Park Avenue and Stanley St., on Murray St. between the canal and Chatham St. The plaintiff asks for the costs of action. The defendants claim that John Fallaher, whom the plaintiff says engaged him was not the agent of the firm and further that John Fallaher did not engage the plaintiff. The defendants say that this action should be dismissed with costs.

R. H. Bygrave vs. the Township of Brantford; E. R. Read for the plaintiff; A. E. Watts, K.C. for the corporation. The plaintiff is a butcher, carrying on business in the township in premises situated at the corner of Wallace and Brighton Place. He asks for \$150 damages by reason of his cellar becoming flooded. The defendants deny liability for the damage.

This action will not likely be heard owing to evidence from the West, taken by commission, not having arrived.

The Criminal Cases
The two criminal cases are both perjury. The first is the case of Rex vs. O. M. Mackie, arising out of a recent suit by the latter in the case of Cummings vs. Mackie, in which the latter swore that Cummings had held him up with a gun and made him sign documents because of the threat Cummings made that he would shoot Mackie down if he did not do as Cummings told him.

The second is that of Rex vs. Ernest George Pike, reminiscent of a recent police court case. The accused swore when on trial that he secured a revolver from one Z. Handler, second hand dealer in Kingston, while in the company of Alexander Silver, a guard at Kingston penitentiary, and that he could not secure the latter as a witness as he was at Stony Mountain Penitentiary, Manitoba. The Crown has secured affidavits from Z. Handler, that he has not had or sold a revolver in two years, and the other from Silver that he never was in Handler's store in his life, and that he never was in with Pike, as the latter swore he was. Further, Silver affirms that he was not out of Kingston this year.

street, and was forced to admit that teaming was the main cause.

Mr. J. P. Numan gave it as his opinion that the roads from the junction to the intersection of William and Grand Rivers, along William to Willow and down Willow to the outskirts of the town, again following Grand River to Dundas street and down Dundas to where the work would be done on Willow, would cost the town some \$15,000 for an asphaltized road. His plan was considered the best of any put forward.

It was also the opinion of those present that the new council should submit a by-law to compel teamsters to use wider tires for heavy loads than those now in use.

Among other things brought up, Mayor Patterson said that the Hydro Commission had notified the local Hydro Board that power would be furnished to Paris on the 27th of this month. Reference to Hydro power brought out the fact that the Hydro engineer had estimated that \$15,000 would be sufficient to cover the expenses of the town inside the town limits, but to make sure of having enough, \$25,000 had been raised by debentures and now they find they will be some \$15,000 short on the total expenditure.

All the present council with the exception of Ald. Fasken, who has been made ineligible by accepting the position of bridge warden, stand for re-election. They together with Chas. Walker, Jas. Sinclair and Henry Stroud, if he will consent to run, will be the choice of the Board of Trade for the progressive council of 1914.

The School Board held a short and businesslike session last night, transacting all their business in thirty minutes in order to allow the members to attend other meetings in town.

Those present were, Chairman Inkster, Messrs. Duntun, Whitby, Hillborn, Mann, O'Neal, Logie, Telfer and Haire.

The report of the public school principal showed a total of 519 pupils on the roll, with an average daily attendance of 473 or 91 per cent. During the month \$110.17 had been added to the penny bank account, which now totalled \$184.33.

The management committee reported a state of congestion in many of the lower grades, a large number of parents having to look after from 70 to 80 pupils, and they recommended that the vacant room in the new Central school be furnished and another teacher engaged.

On motion of Messrs. Duntun and Harris the report was adopted. Some 40 or 50 seats will be placed in the vacant room, together with table and desk, and an am. 2d will be placed in the room for a teacher for the second book at a salary of \$500 per year.

The Government grant for the evening classes in domestic science is \$219. Two hundred towards the teacher's salary and \$197 for equipment. On motion of Messrs. Hillborn and Mann the \$200 will be returned to Mr. Penman, who pays this salary.

According to an agreement with Miss Mitchell, her salary was increased from \$480 to \$450, commencing Jan. 1st.

The board then adjourned, this being the last meeting of the present board.

SEMPER OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS

A NY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, who has a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency of that Agency and make at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, or brother, or brother or sister of the homestead.

Butter—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land, in each of three years, and the holder must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years from date of homestead entry, and use required to say homestead (parent), and cultivate 10 acres each.

In case of a homesteader in pre-emption who pre-empt a quarter section, he must reside upon the homestead in each of three years, and use required to say homestead (parent), and cultivate 10 acres each.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may pre-empt a quarter section in Canada, Ontario, price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 10 acres and erect a house worth \$2000.
