MYSTERY SOLVED

RESULT OF AN OLD QUARREL

Suspicion Rests on One Whom the Murdered Man Had Once Rivalled in Love—They Quarrelled the Day Before the Murder.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—A special received here from Valleyfield says: "The tragic death of Theodore Myer, of St. Barbe, is no longer shrouded in mystery. The authorities have ascertained most of the facts connected with his death and their suspicion rests on a man, whom they believe an arrest is expected to take place at any moment."

Last night Coroner Demers, of St. Martin; Crown Prosecutor Elliott, of Beauport; and Chief of Police Parrier, of Valleyfield, drove to St. Barbe. The inquest was formally opened and the jury empaneled, after which an adjournment was made.

St. Barbe is a small hamlet, but when the correspondent arrived there Deane's hotel, kept by a brother-in-law of the murdered man, was crowded with people. It was almost impossible for the officials of the Crown to gain admittance. The proceedings were formal, and lasted of half an hour the party were on the way back to Valleyfield with the exception of Crown Prosecutor Elliott, who, it is believed, remained to take the steps necessary for an arrest of St. Barbe, and in fact the people for many miles around, are considerably excited over the tragedy, but they do not differ to any extent from the statement already published. Myer, it seems, was driving to Dundas to see his father-in-law and on reaching Dupont's hotel at Casaville, was informed by a relative that his journey would be useless as his father-in-law was away. Myer then accepted an invitation to join a card party. They had not been playing many minutes before a man named Corry, who had been invited to the party to drink with him. Several of the crowd did but Myer took a cigar.

"The deceased and Corry, it transpires, once loved the same person, the one that lost a leg in the war. Corry was the father of six little ones. The two men were supposed to talk over old times and Corry was to be the guest of Myer's. The two men quarrelled, nothing more than hard words were exchanged, however, and after proceeding a short distance Corry departed abruptly for home, and Myer did likewise; both leaving within a few minutes of each other. The story of the quarrel was a home a corpse has already been told."

The deed of the assassin was witnessed by no one and the evidence against the suspected man is almost entirely circumstantial. Crown prosecutor Elliott came back at noon from St. Barbe and has gone on an important journey."

MONTREAL, Aug. 25.—A special from St. Barbe, Que., says: "The suspected murderer of Theodore Myer of St. Barbe has been arrested. He was taken on a farm a mile from the scene of the tragedy by Chief of Police Parrier. Three very important witnesses for the crown have been found."

Mass was conducted at the residence of the deceased by the parish priest. Two hundred farmers, about one mile west of the scene was a pathetic one. There is a strong feeling of dissatisfaction among the people of the district generally, complaining of the way the administration of justice has been for a number of years and is commencing to feel the authorities are too tedious and expensive and that criminals are given ample time to escape before any move is taken to punish them. The relatives and friends of the murdered man are complaining in strong terms of unnecessary delay in holding the inquest, and the authorities are doing nothing apparently having been done, and the body is fast decomposing. The inhabitants are so angry that they have had management that no detective was placed on the case at once. The authorities at St. Barbe, Que., are so angry that they have gained currency that a drunken brawl took place there and the murder was committed there, as there was no coroner and the murder actually took place some two miles from Casaville."

Naval Parade in Montreal.
MONTREAL, Aug. 24.—A grand naval parade was given yesterday by the sailors and marines of the Canadian fleet, comprising the American squadron, now on a visit here. Nearly five hundred sailors were landed from the ships and marched through the principal streets to the Champs de Mars, where they were met by a number of the militia. The fire brigade gave a turn out in honor of the visitors. Admiral Sir John Hopkins and the captain of the gunboat were the guests of the city at a grand dinner given at the Windsor.

How Lookout Met His Death.
HAMILTON, Ont., Aug. 24.—At the inquest into the death of James Lookout, whose body was found at the foot of Bay St. on Sunday morning last, the jury, after hearing the evidence of Dr. Edgar Stark and holding a post-mortem examination, and other witnesses, returned a verdict that deceased had died from a pharyngitis through being choked by partially digested food getting into the breathing apparatus. Lookout had been intoxicated on the night previous. He had no relatives in this country.

A Serious Shooting Affray.
CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Aug. 24.—A shooting affray occurred at Wood Island, by which a young man named William J. McMillan will likely lose his life. McMillan with some other boys went to a neighboring house where there lives an old bachelor McNeil, and his spinster sister. The boys began teasing him and he took a gun loaded with sperdies and fired at the boys through the window, hitting McMillan in the abdomen. Doctors say he cannot live.

Sword Championship of Canada.
HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 23.—The annual sword championship of Canada, which was held at night last night by Sergeant Major Morgan, of Kingston, Ont., and Sergeant Major Kelly, of Halifax, for the championship of Canada was won by Kelly who scored 25 points in the five combats to his opponent's 8. The sword contest was only one that was close. Several boxing bouts filled in the time between the combats.

Boys' Tour in Ireland.
NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—J. O'Donovan Rossa, the dynamic agitator, arrived from Queensland yesterday, for the purpose of touring the city of Dublin, but he was defeated by an organized political party. He was well treated and enjoyed his three months' sojourn in Ireland. Everything was very flat in Dublin, according to Mr. Rossa, and political interests were languishing.

BIG BLAZE AT OTTAWA

Booth's Lumber Yards in the Suburbs Swept by Fire.

LOADED LUMBER CARS BURNED
A Public School and a Railway Bridge Also Fell Freely to the Flames—The Total Loss a Heavy One—The Fire Believed to be Inevitable.

OTTAWA, Aug. 27.—A big conflagration visited Ottawa yesterday afternoon. A fire alarm came from Rochester, on the west side of the city, while about the same time an alarm was sounded from New Edinburgh in the opposite direction, on the east side of the city. A very small blaze in the New Edinburgh direction was extinguished with a few pails of water. The fire in Rochester started in the piles of lumber belonging to John R. Booth, it was with some difficulty that the brigade got to work owing to the length of hose required and the scarcity of the necessary fire protection in the way of hydrants at this point. As a consequence the fire spread rapidly and soon got entirely beyond control of the city brigade, which was assisted by the Union Fire Brigade, an organization belonging to the Chaudiere lumbermen.

The fire was extending towards the city when six o'clock when the wind changed and it then proceeded north and south. Had this not fortunately occurred the whole of Rochester would have been a risk of being burned. As it was the loss was heavy.

The territory covered by the fire was about ten acres. There is being six and eight million feet of lumber on this lot, which is owned by the Booths, which was valued at about \$150,000. Besides this there were six railway cars with lumber belonging to the Export Lumber Company. There were also the Cedar Street public school which was burned to the ground and which was a loss of about \$3,000. There was only one small dwelling house near the school. The Perry Sound Railway bridge was destroyed. It is generally believed that the fire was the work of an incendiary. It was more or less under control, but Booth was on the scene from the first and worked until the last.

ESTIMATES OF THE WHEAT CROP OF 1894.

YONKONING, N. Y., Aug. 27.—The annual international grain fair will open here today. The official crop estimates for 1894 as compared with 1893 are given by percentages from the Department of Agriculture, none being received from Bulgaria and several divisions of Russia. The figures for the countries outside of Europe are: India, 6,925,000 tons of wheat, against 7,740,000 last year; United States, 300,000,000 bush of wheat, against 320,000,000 last year; Canada, 38,000,000 bush of wheat, against 30,000,000 last year.

Toronto Hotel Robbed.
TORONTO, Aug. 27.—When the proprietor of the Shakspeare hotel, York End Wellington street, opened up on Saturday morning he found that the bolts on the door had been tampered with and burglar had entered through the transom. About \$200 in money and 1,500 cigars were taken. The job must have been done between the hours of one and half-past four o'clock. The corner is one of the best lighted in the city, and policemen, night-watchmen and pedestrians passing that point at all hours of the night.

A Railroad Magnate Dies Suddenly.
YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Aug. 27.—President John Newell, of the L. S. and M. S. Railroad, and also president of the Pittsburg and Lake Erie road, died at the Tod house yesterday. While Mr. Newell was in his private car near Newmarket, on the way to Cambridge, Pa., he was taken suddenly ill. A fast run was made to this city and he was removed to the Tod house, where he died at noon and was with his father in his last moments.
