What the Moon Indicates

A clear moon indicates frost. A dull-looking moon indicates rain. A single halo around the moon indicates storm. A double halo 'means very poisterous weather. If the moon looks high, cold weather may be expected. If it looks low down, warm weather is probable. The new moon on its back enotes wet weather. If the moon changes with the wind in the east we shall have bad weather. If the moon is bright and clear when three days old, fine weather is coming. When the moon is visible in daytime we may ook for cool days. When the points of the cresent of the new moon are very distinctly defined frost may be expected. If the new moon appears with the points upward then the moon will be dry, but should they be downward, more or less rain may be looked for during the next three weeks.
