

"As the law now stands, upon information being laid that a person matter of providing more asylum acis insang, and dangerous to be at large, a warrant may be issued for his arrest, he may be held for examination, and if insanity is established he may be ordered to the asylum. Pending the enquiry into his sanity he must be confined in some safe and comfortable place, or in the custody of the constable, or other person who apprehended him, or such other safe custody as the justice deems fit, but, the Act proceeds, in no case shall such alleged insane person be committed as a disorderly person to any prison, jail or lock-up for criminals, unless he be violent and dangerous, and there is no other suitable place for his confinement, nor shall he be confined in the same room with a person charged with or convicted of a crime.' It is therefore the manifest intent of the law, as amended last session, that prisons shall not be used for the incarceration of lunatics, either before or after conviction, unless they are too disorderly to be held elsewhere during the interval between committal and verdict. As a 'safe and comfortable place' for the holding of harmless persons awaiting examination the justice might designate an TALKING PARROTS hotel or bearding house. 
