MILES FROM POLE

The Intrepid Peary Makes The Record Of "Farthest North"

WAS GONE OVER A YEAR

New York, Nov. 3.—The United States now holds the record of "farthest north," 87 degrees 6 minutes.

This feat was accomplished by Commander Robert E. Peary of the United States navy. What Commander Peary did, and his experiences during the past year in the frozen north, are briefly but vividly summarized in a



COMMANDER R. E. PEARY.

To communication received by Herbert L. Bridgeman, secretary of the Peary Arctic Club. This communication follows:

"Hopedale, Labrador (via Twillingate, Newfoundiand), Nov. 2:

"To Herbert L. Bridgeman:
"Roosevelt wintered north coast of Grantland, somewhat north of Alert's winter quarters. Went north with sledges in February via Heckla and Columbia. Delayed by open water between 34th and 35th degrees. Beyond 86th six days. Gale disrupted, ice destroyed coaches, cut off communication with supporting bodies, and drifting steadily eastward. Commander Peary's polar steamship, the Roosevelt, left New York on her long journey in search of the north pole on July 16, 1905. The vessel for which funds were furnished by the Peary Arctic Club of New York, was designed particularly for Arctic exploration. She cost about \$100,000. The Roosevelt had a crew of twenty men.

The previous record for the point nearest the pole was made by Captain Cagni of the Duke of the Abruzzi's Italian expedition, who reached 86.34 north, or within 237 statute miles of the pole. The point reached by Peary (87.6) places him about 203 miles from the pole.

Are Not Qualified To Teach In The Schools Of Ontario

CHRISTIAN BROS. LOSE

London, Nov. 3.—(C. A. P.)—The Privy Council yesterday dismissed without costs the appeal of the Brothers of the Christian Schools vs. the Minister of Education of Ontarlo.

History of the Case.

The appeal on which the Privy Council has given its decision originated in the Ottawa separate schools, where the question of the qualifications of the Christian Brothers for teaching in the schools was raised. Certain communities instituted for religious purposes were in 1860 engaged in educational work in Lower Canada, and the members were at the time of the passing of the B. N. A. Act, exempt from undergoing an examination as teacher in the Province of Quebec. The question, stated by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, was whether these members, Council, was whether these members, who had joined since the passing of the above act, were to be considered qualified teachers for the purpose of the Separate Schools Act, where such members had not received certificates of qualification to take high the account. qualification to teach in the schools o

this province.

This was the form in which the mat-This was the form in which the matter was put as a stated case before the Court of Appeal, and the Minister of Education for Ontario, Mr. Harcourt, was associated with the Bi-Lingual Teachers' Association of Eastern Ontario in asking for a decision.

I have taken considerable trouble to find out how tigers kill large game, writes an assistant comptroller of forests at Perah. Some time ago I was asked to come and see a full grewn bullock that had been killed by a tiger. On examining it I found the animal had its neck broken, and there were claw marks on the nose and shoulder and nowhere else. There was no doubt that the tiger had jumped at the bull and landed on the shoulder, and when the bull turned his head to gore the tiger he must have put his claw out and with a sudden jerk broken the neck. The case was then carried to the Privy Council.

Has Far-Reaching effects.

The far-reaching effect of the Judgment may be gathered from the following facts: There are three Separate school districts in Ontario. In one, which includes Toronto, there are 174 teachers of the religious community. Of these only 48 hold certificates. The remainder includes 25 Christian Brothers. In another district there are 38 teachers without certificates, while of the 108 religious teachers in the other only about 25 per cent. are qualified.

There are only three Protestant separate schools in the province, with 319 pupils. All the teachers are qualified.

No Official Statement.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Hon. Dr. Pyne, Minister of Education, when informed of the Judgment yesterday, said he could not make a statement until he read the text.

Dr. John Seath, Superintendent of Education, when asked as to what steps would have to follow the decision, said: "All I can say at the present time is that the Department will not deal with this important matter in a sectional spirit, but will seek to consider only the general public good.

Rev. Father Rohleder, secretary of the Separate School Board, said: "I am not in a position to say what the Brothers will do. I think, however, the Government should grant them permission to teach until they pass an examination, so that they can obtain certificates."
