THE MOTION IS RESCINDED

Bowlers Will Not be Allowed to Fence off Park

NIMBLE SIDE STEPPING

At last night's meeting of the City Council, Ald. Stone moved that the motion made by the Council at their last meeting, relative to granting permission to the lawn bowlers to erect a fence around their space on Tecumseh Park, be rescinded. Ald. Stone said that the action of the Council had raised a terrible howl, and the only way to make matters right was to rescind the motion.

Ald. Austin, as the matter had been left at the discretion of the Parks and Cemetery committee, and they need not construct the fence if they thought better of it.

Ald. Stone—You can't throw the blame on me. I voted against the measure. Further, I might state that the majority of the bowlers themselves were opposed to it.

Ald. Austin—The bowlers were all in favor of it.

Ald. Stone—The president himself opposed it.

Ald. Austin—I have heard some of these gentlemen speak whom Ald. Stone is so fond of quoting, and they did not speak as though they were against it.

Ald. Edmondson said that he would second Ald. Stone's motion. The matter was certainly no joke, and the Council should make all haste to rescind such a ridiculous, nonsensical and uncalculated motion. The sooner the infamous resolution were done away with the better.

Ald. Edmondson admitted voting taken by The Planet in the matter, and I must say that I wouldn't vote for such a resolution even if my own father had asked me.

Ald. Potter said that the motion as put was out of order. It should be made by the mover and seconder of the former resolution.

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THE EXPERT MAKES REPORT

Hints That Flaws in Market Were Due to the Specifications

HIS REPORT IS ADOPTED

The report of the expert engaged to look into the defects in the market building was presented before the City Council. The expert, although he was paid \$12.50 for his work, did not present a very exhaustive report and was not present at the meeting to explain many indefinite portions of it.

Ald. Potter read the report of D. McBrayen, of Walkerville, who inspected the market building and the Police Station yesterday at the Council's request. The report stated that to the best of his judgment, he had found building according to specifications. The floors were all right but needed an inch matched floor over them to keep down falling through the cracks. The dust nuisance could be overcome by canvassing and ceiling, but this would not be as satisfactory as the matched floor.

Ald. Potter said that he thought that certain portions of the report would indicate that the architect's plans were not all that they should be.

Ald. Edmondson, however, was of the opinion that the report indicated both Mr. Rutley and Mr. Carswell, and he moved, seconded by Ald. Stone, that the Council pass a resolution vindicting these gentlemen.

The Mayor did not think that any such resolution was necessary.

Ald. Edmondson said that he would not have moved the resolution had not Ald. Potter intimated that the architect's plans were loose.

Ald. Potter said that he still maintained that the plans were loose, and that he was prepared to stick by his contentions.

Ald. Austin thought that the passing of Ald. Edmondson's resolution would place the Council in a false position.

The Mayor ruled Ald. Edmondson's resolution out of order.

Ald. Potter moved, seconded by Ald. Massey, that Mr. McBrayen's report be adopted.—Carried.
