Sisters in Yucatan.

Sisters in Yucatan have a fancy for dressing precisely alike in the minutest particulars, so that not a bow or a button, a flower or an article of jewelry varies. Life of an Iron Horse.

"The iron horse does not last much longer than the horse of flesh and bone," said an old New York Central engineer to a reporter recently. The ordinary life of a locomotive is about thirty years. Some of the smaller parts require renewing every six months; the boiler tubes last five years and the crank axles six years; tires, rollers and fire spread boxes from six to seven years; the side frames, axles and other parts, thirty years. An important advantage is that a broken part can be replaced, and does not condemn the whole locomotive to the junk shop, while, when a horse breaks a leg, the whole animal is only worth the flesh, fat and bones, which amount to a very small sum in this country, where horse flesh does not find its way to the butcher's market. — New York Mail and Express.
