Editorial Chat.

The Liberal-Conservatives have selected Sir MacKenzie Bowell for their leader in the Senate.

The elections in North Grey and Sunbury Counties which took place on Tuesday resulted in the election of both ministers Blair and Patterson, by large majorities.

Senator Hill, probably the most influential Democrat in New York state, who has hitherto been a sound money man, has signified his intention of standing by Bryan in the coming presidential election in the U. S.

The debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne which was moved by Mr. McInnes on Monday is being carried on with considerable brilliancy by both the Government and Opposition.

The Winnipeg board of trade is anxious for the Halifax board of trade to co-operate with a view to the appointing of agents in northern Europe for the purpose of encouraging immigration to Canada.

The Baptist Convention.

The Convention of Baptist churches in the Maritime Provinces opened at Berwick on Friday of last week. The Baptist Institute held its meeting on Friday afternoon.

The matter of organizing a summer school of theology was brought before the institute by Rev. J. G. C. White on behalf of the governors of the college. After a thorough discussion of the subject, it was voted that a committee of the institute be appointed to confer with the governors of the college with reference to establishing a summer school.

The maritime B. Y. P. U. met on Friday evening, George McDonald, President. The secretary-treasurer, Rev. F. Beak, read the report, from which it appears that there are 182 societies in connection with the union.

The annual meeting of the W. B. M. Union took place in the Methodist church, Berwick, the same day. A short devotional meeting was held, presided over by Mrs. Nalder, of Windsor.
