War on Cigarettes.

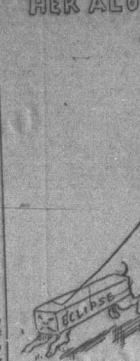
It is now thought that steps have been taken which will lessen the use of cigarettes by the boys in the Chicago public schools. 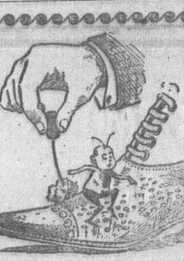

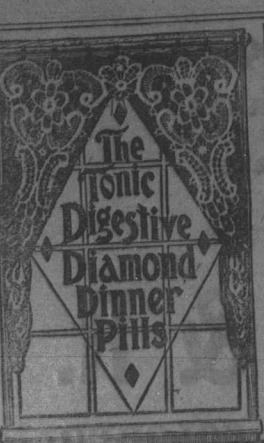
