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ENGLISH POETRY TO BE MORE SUBTLE, SAYS EDMUND GOSSE

London, July 2.—Edmund Gosse recently lectured to the English Association at the University of Toronto. The lecturer, said the lecturer, to the future of English poetry seemed to him to rest in the necessity of refreshment of expression. With the super-abundant circulation of language year by year, week after week, the possibilities of freshness grew rarer and rarer. The obvious simple, poignant things seemed all to have been said. Each generation was likely to be more preoccupied than the last, with the desire for novelty of expression.

Accordingly the sense of originality, which was so fervently demanded from every new school of writers, would force the poets of the future to sweep away all recognized impressions. In consequence the naturalness of the English and the obvious forms of English speech would be driven from the national poetry. In new generations there was likely to occur less description of plain material objects, because the aspect of these had already received every obvious tribute.

Also there could hardly fail to be less precise enumeration of the primitive natural emotions, because that also had been done already and repeated to satiety. Poetry as an art, in one shape or another, would escape from the bankruptcy of language, but it would only be at the cost of much that they at present admired and liked that the continuity of the art of verse would be preserved.

He expected to find the poet accepting a more and more symbolic subtlety of expression. In his anxiety to avoid the trite and superficial he would achieve effect by wrapping the truth in darkness. The poetry of the future was likely to be very much occupied with subjects and with these alone. The poetry of the future, also, might not improbably become more and more dramatic, although perhaps by a series of facts of definite creation, rather than as the result of observation, which would be left to the ever-increasing adroitness of the brilliant masters of our prose.

PLEASE GLAD "YANKEES" GO

South Carolina Loses Federal Support of Militia

Columbia, S.C., June 30.—Because he declined recently to muster out of service as required by the Dick law certain companies of the National Guard of South Carolina which had failed to measure up to the standard of efficiency required by the War Department, Gov. Col. Bleas was advised recently by Brig. Gen. Mills, U.S.A., chief of the division of militia affairs, that Federal support of the South Carolina militia would be withdrawn.

The United States army officers assigned to this State will be removed, the arms and supplies furnished by the War Department to the militia taken back and the \$75,000 appropriation for

the annual encampment withheld. Without Federal aid the encampment cannot be held.

However, Gov. Bleas said he was convinced that the militia would rather have no encampment than "be tossed by Yankees."

"Praise the Lord," said the Governor, "South Carolina is again free from the domination of Yankee uniforms and once more in control of her own State militia."

Gov. Bleas said Gen. Mill's message was justification of the fight which Bleas had made against the Dick law and he now expected that the Legislature would repeal it.

VOTE TO IMPEACH SOCIALIST

Charges Against Milwaukee Tax Commissioner Sustained

Milwaukee, Wis., June 30.—Tax Commissioner Louis A. Arnold's impeachment is recommended by the special committee that has investigated the charges against the Socialist holdover official since the middle of January. The committee voted for impeachment, 4 to 1, Alderman A. J. Welsh, Socialist, alone dissenting.

Two of the five charges against the commissioner have been sustained. These charges relate to his dismissal of assessors for political reasons and coercion in the assessment of the Second Ward Savings Bank stock. This bank stock was reduced from \$200 to \$150 a share.

Three of the charges were not sustained. They were to the effect that Arnold wasted city materials, that he is controlled by the Socialist party and that he slandered the assessors after their discharge.

JOHN DICKINSON CHIEF MAGISTRATE

London, July 2.—The home secretary has appointed John Dickinson to the post of chief magistrate for the police courts of the metropolis in place of Sir Henry Curtis Bennett. Mr. Dickinson was recently appointed one of the magistrates at Bow street, previous to which he had been for 23 years attached to the Thames police court.

Mr. Dickinson was called to the bar at the Inner Temple in 1871. He is a convinced believer in the value of those boys' organizations, such as the Boys' Brigade, which accustom boys to a healthy discipline. If there were more discipline there would be less crime, he thinks, a great deal of crime being due to the fact that so many boys grow into slouching men with slouching minds.

SUSSEX BOYS BUILD BRIDGE

Frant, Eng., July 2.—Boy Scouts at Frant (Sussex) have erected a model bridge, 88 feet by 11 feet, composed mainly of chestnut poles with a "roadway" of oak slabs.

SOUTH AFRICAN EXPORT AGENT REVIEWS WORK

London, July 2.—An able and extremely extensive report has been issued by C. du Chiappini, trade commissioner in London for the Union government of Africa, which covers the several export trades of the Union, as well as trades to which Mr. Chiappini's notice has been directed as presenting possibilities of new export business.

More than 3,000 persons called at the commissioner's office during the year for information concerning South Africa generally. Numerous people have been interviewed by the commissioner who were anxious to settle in South Africa or to establish their sons there.

In connection with publicity work Mr. Chiappini states that its value is very great and that it is receiving the careful attention of his department. Effective advertising of South African products does not consist of "mere displays of pretty pictures and curiosities at exhibitions or in show windows," says the report. "If real results are to be obtained a good supply of real commercial samples of South African produce, with full information relating thereto must always be available. In addition well considered and businesslike schemes of advertisement must be considered and funds must not be stinted."

BRUSSELS CANAL FETE ARRANGED

Ghent, Belgium, July 2.—Considerable activity is being manifested in regard to the projected inauguration of the Brussels ship canal which is arranged to take place on June 1, 1914. Elaborate festivities are being planned, among which is a reception in honor of the King. His majesty, coming from Brussels by the canal, will review the imposing yacht squadron moored along the shore. Nautical sports will also form an important part of the day's proceedings, as well as a reception and banquet at the famous town hall. The committee of arrangements, which is to include many prominent persons of Belgium will shortly be installed and begin action.

GOVERNMENT IS CALLED SCANDAL BY WALTER LONG

London, July 2.—Grand council of the Primrose League recently presented a portrait of Walter Long, M. P., chancellor of the League, to Lady Doreen Long. The presentation of the portrait, which had been painted by Cecil Jameson, a New Zealand artist, was made by Viscount Middleton.

After thanking grand council on behalf of himself and his wife for the portrait, Mr. Long referred to the fact that this year the Primrose League had brought itself into line with the ordinary organization of the Unionist party. He believed that step to be a wise one. The seven years during which this government had been in office had been momentous for the country.

There never had been a time when it was more necessary for every man and

woman who cared for the country and the empire to put their shoulders to the wheel in order that they might turn this government out of office, and see the country under the guidance of men who would be content with sane and well-thought out reform. The present state of things was a public scandal.

There could be no doubt the government had wholly lost the confidence of the country, yet they were deliberately proceeding to force through Parliament without consulting the people two measures of a most destructive character. One was designed to create a form of self-government in Ireland and the other to rob the four Welsh dioceses of the English church of money hitherto devoted to the service of God, and give it to purely secular objects. They were doing this in defiance of public opinion. It was a public scandal and those who cared for the traditions under which the country had been governed in the past ought to redouble their efforts and make up their minds that this should be the last year of government by the present advisers of his majesty.
