Paris, Oct 5 — The allies are striking hard in three separate points of the German right wing Near Soissons, where the allies got first a firm foothold on the north side of the Aisne river, the French and British are making vigorous efforts to drive home a wedge between the German right and the German center The allies have already captured several streng positions there, together with a number of lines of trenches Hard fighting is going on near Roye and Douai

The arrival of President Poincare at the front, the optimistic tone of official information, and the great number of prisoners passing through Paris from the battle zone all indicate that victory for the allies is imminent Information says this is already an accomplished fact, and there is a decided conviction that the Anglo-French army has gained a

### British Defending Antwerp (Special to The News)

Antwerp—British and Belgian troops are fighting shoulder to shoulder in the defence of Antwerp, according to a statement from the war office today Belgian field artillery is now co-operating effectually with the British heavy artillery According to a report the British forces took up an entrenched position along the Nethe river, opposite to the river Save, bombarded the Servian town of Shabats on Saturday

# Paris Official Message Surprising

(Special to The News) Paris-"We have been compelled to give ground at certain points, is an admission made in an official statement this afternoon. The 16th street near Van Horne. statement declares, however, the battle is so far indecisive.
