The Postmaster General's Crazy Freak

The Postmaster General, after some negotiations with representatives of the Canadian Press Association in regard to an increase of postal rates, put a bill through the Commons that gave him the absolute right to fix the rate according to his own sweet will. The Press Association got after the bill in the Senate, strongly urging that the rates should be fixed by Parliament, and the bill did not become law. And now the Postmaster General evidently with a small-minded desire to get even with the newspaper men announces that he will in future demand the maximum rate authorized by law—one-quarter of a cent on papers not delivered by letter carrier and one cent addi-

And here is the most wonderful official misinterpretation of a statute that ever found its way into a circular. It comes to us signed 'A. W. Throop, Secretary.' Listen to it!

'As regards the 1c. rate, the law is that this rate shall be for each poundweight or any fraction of a pound weight, that is, 1c. must be paid for each copy. The law does not establish a bulk rate of postage, and this question of 1c. for each copy must now be met.

The law is that newspapers and periodicals sent to subscribers or news agents in Canada, within a distance of 300 miles, shall pay a cent a pound or fraction of a pound weight, and this is interpreted to mean that much a copy! The man who makes such an absurd interpretation should be put in a glass case and carried around the country for exhibition as a human curiosity. It is no wonder that the newspaper men refused to consent to fixing of rates by such a man as this. It is an idiotic interpretation. It would be laughed out of any court of justice. It is unworthy of any brain that does not belong to an animal on all fours. There is no common sense or reason in it. It makes an ounce paper—the average country paper—pay as much as the ten to fourteen-ounce papers that are issued in the big cities.—Chatham World.

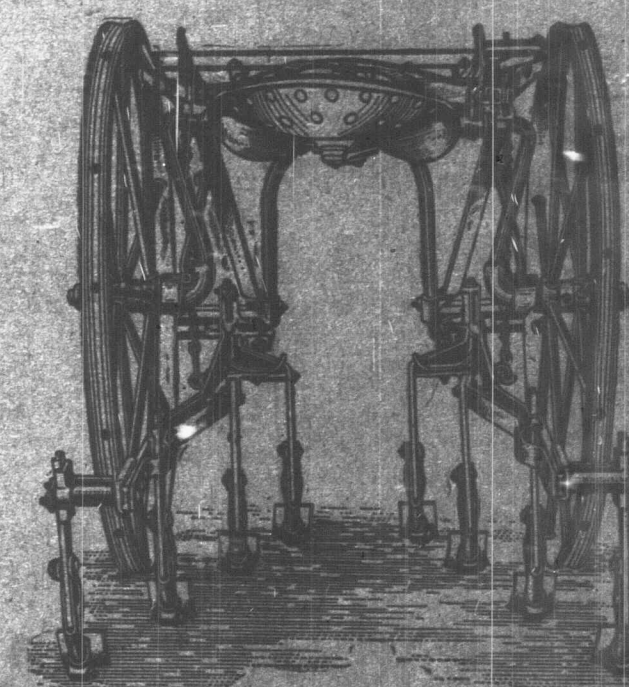
