General News.
—Thursday, November 6th, will be
Thanksgiving Day.
—Eighteen persons were killed and
50 wounded in the election riot at Goa.
—During an exciting personal encounter
in Chicago, between two notorious
gamblers, each fatally shot the other.
—Seavin and McAllister, the pugilists
have been arrested by the London police
for proposing to fight.
—It is reported that a repentant sin-
ner has made a donation of \$30,000 to
the Bon Pasteur, Quebec.
—A revolution has taken place in
Manipur. The Maharajah has fled and
his brother assumed control.
—The officials of Chicago have entered
upon a crusade against the smoking
nuisance, and a number of wealthy citi-
zens have been fined fifty dollars each.
—If pure milk only were sold in Lon-
don it is estimated that from 20,000 to
30,000 more cows would be wanted to
keep up the supply.
—The trial of Birchall for the mur-
der of young Benwell began at Wood-
stock, Ont., last week. A jury was em-
panelled with little difficulty.
—Physicians in Paris have discovered
that the summit of the Eiffel tower pro-
vides an excellent air bath, and daily
recommend their patients to try it.
—Postmaster Wamaker ought to
feel at ease. He has his life insured for
\$700,000, and while the fact is not
generally published, it is also true that
he has his job insured for \$400,000.
—A meeting of the provincial govern-
ment of Mercedes, Argentina has been sup-
pressed. Senor Alari, President of
Union Civica, has offered his resignation
but the committee refuses to accept it.
—The warehouses at Liverpool of all
the Atlantic lines are crammed with
goods which merchants are anxious to
export before October. Freight has
advanced 60 to 70 shillings a ton.
—General master workman Ploverly
has addressed a circular to members of
the Knights of Labor to secure expres-
sion of their sentiments as favoring inde-
pendent political action by the order.
—The latest advice from Labrador
say that the fishery is very good. Ever
craft heard from is loaded. The catch
this season is said to be the best for
twenty years.
—The Scotch furnace men have struck
for higher wages. The furnace men are
being blown out. The iron market at
Glasgow is excited in consequence of the
strike.
—The shareholders of the Cape of
Good Hope bank, which has suspended,
are under reserve liability to pay the
amount actually called upon. The li-
abilities of the bank amount to \$3,500,
000, due mainly to customers.
—A Bad Axe (Mich.) special says re-
ports from a storm in Huron County
have just come to hand. Fall hail to
the depth of eight inches and literally
wiped the crops away. The damage is
estimated at \$300,000.
—Fears are entertained for the safety
of the police patrol boat on Lake Win-
nipeg, which has not been heard from
last week in August. She is long over-
due at the mouth of the Red River.
There are two mounted policemen and
two sailors on board.
—Rev. George Bruce, pastor of St.
David's, Presbyterian Church, of St.
John, N. B., has been designated for
the principality of the New Govern-
ment Industrial school for the Indians
at Regina.
—Berlin has a Jewish population of
90,000, and 20 of the most influential
and widely circulated journals in that
city are controlled by Jewish money and
brains. The Car has stirred up a po-
re or less demonstrative, but more power-
ful to wear him out than the nihilist.
—The village of Strath, in the can-
ton of St. Gall, Switzerland, is on fire.
Three hundred houses have already been
destroyed. The loss of one life is re-
ported. All of the people whose houses
have been burned are in a destitute con-
dition.
—The Indians on the Sioux reserva-
tion, South Dakota, are expecting the
coming of Christ, daily. He is, they
suppose, to cover the earth with a stratum
of solid thirty feet deep, covering up
every body but the good Indians, and
will squirm through to the surface to find
a veritable "hunting ground" on earth.
—Experiments have been made at
Madgeburg, with a new quick firing gun
of 53 centimetres calibre in the presence
of officers from America, England, Rus-
sia and other countries. France was not
represented. Fifty shots a minute
were fired and the trial was a great suc-
cess.
—Queen Victoria plays the piano and
organ and away back in the dim and
distant past had cultivated voice. The
Prince of Wales dallies with the banjo.
The Car plays the French horn when
there are no Nihilists or other bad tem-
pered people around, and is likewise a
clever performer on the piano.

WOMEN'S COLUMN.
Conducted by the Ladies of the Sackville
W. C. T. U.
**Maritime W. C. T. U., at Am-
herst, N. S.**
(Continued.)
Why should we falter and grow weary
when God is working through all our ef-
forts, and it is by his strength we are
sustained. It is his patience that should
inspire ours. His love that makes our
hearts grow tender toward his other
children and creates the desire to help
them. In the fulness of time, He may
permit us to know that the good we
perpetrate has been accomplished, and over
the white ribbon lilies, "someday may
flash the glad message: "See! what
God hath wrought."
Greetings were then received from
the Baptist Women's Missionary Society
and from the editors of the Woman's
Journal.
In the evening a most interesting pub-
lic meeting was held in the Methodist
church. A large and appreciative au-
dience gathered, though the rain was
pouring incessantly.
The report of the W. C. T. U. organ-
izer, Mrs. Tremblay, of Hantsport, was
as follows:—"During the year I have
organized in all 16 Unions; 7 in Nova
Scotia, 5 in New Brunswick, and 4 in
P. E. Island. The names of the unions
organized this year, are in N. S.—Great
Village, Pictou, Stellarton, Acadia
Mines, Pugwash, Lunenburg and Mid-
dleton. In N. B.—Dagobourne, Bath-
urst, Richibucto, Kingston, and Black-
ville. In P. E. Island—Souris, Mon-
tague, Murray Harbor and Union. In
addition to these I met a few ladies in
Sackville Ferry, N. S., and a committee
is formed to prepare for an organization
there. In Mr. Stewart, P. E. Island,
20 names were sent in a week after my
visit, representing the number of ladies
prepared to organize."
The organizers report shows a grati-
fying increase. Some unions have also
been organized this year by others.
We clip from the Amherst Press the
following report of the public mass
meeting:—
In the evening a public meeting was
held in the Methodist Church, Amherst,
Mrs. W. Turnbull, president of the
Union presiding.
The president in opening the proceed-
ings, spoke of glad tidings that had been
received by them from all parts of Nova
Scotia and New Brunswick. The work
was ever extending through the provin-
ces and within the past year or two con-
siderable progress had been made. They
were now all united in the work and go
where they would, they would be sure
to find the white ribbon. Five years
had elapsed since that emblem had been
attached to their work, thus making
social purity part of it. Temperance
and purity work hand in hand, they
could not work for one and do without
the other. That was the legitimate
work of the W. C. T. U.
Mrs. Dunlap, president of Amherst
Union, after according them a hearty
welcome to this town, said the
mission was not only a very important
one but one which reached far
higher than worldly aims and by divine
help they would be able to perform their
duty and go on prospering more and
more each succeeding year. The duty
of every Christian man and woman was
to break these chains which held people
captive, and free them from intemper-
ance. The interests of humanity and a
Christian life required them to do all
they could to do away with the evil of
intemperance. They should all be strong
in this movement so as to be able to
bear each other's burdens. She wished
them all prosperity in the work they
were so deeply interested in and what
they wanted to do was to persevere and
their reward would be sure to come in
the end.
Mrs. Todd, president of St. Stephen's
Union, said that they wanted the
help of every woman in this provin-
ce, also to feel that the Amherst
Union was to be strengthened. They
would like to go away feeling that their
visit had been productive of good. The
work connected with the cause widened
out their whole life. She hoped their
coming would stimulate them and that
the work in this town would prosper.
Mrs. Archibald, of Cow Bay, Cape
Breton, after speaking of the financial
and political aspect of the country, went
on to say that their common foe was the
granting of licenses for dealing in intoxi-
cating liquors. They should train the
coming generation so that they would
plant prohibition barriers over the gov-
ernment places in Ottawa. Although a
woman's home was the sphere of her
work, she should still make that work
radiate from it for the good of others.
They should each one plant the banners
of temperance firmly in their own
homes. "The greatest barrier to the
stoppage of the liquor traffic was the
selfishness of rich men. If they were
to say the poor man whether he would
have prohibition or not he would not at
say the former.
Mrs. Alex. Christie, of the Amherst
Union, read a very interesting paper
which was well received by the large
audience present. The evening's pro-
ceedings were interspersed with choruses
and solos, and proved most enjoyable
throughout.

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Agricultural Notes.
—Very happily, agriculture deals with
more of the sciences than any other in-
dustry, thereby causing agricultural edu-
cation to become more nearly liberal
education than that necessary to any
other industry, or, as it is often called
profession. Very nearly the round of
natural sciences is involved.
—Country cattle shows should arrange
to show the stock in rings for the exami-
nation of awarding committees. No
committee, however well qualified for
their work, is sure of doing justice with
their awards when having to run all over
a show yard to find the different com-
peting animals. There should be more
system and order in the work of the
county societies. Premiums may be
small, but the justice that belongs with
them is of full measure everywhere.
—The following is from the pen of
Prof. H. W. Smith, concerning the
Agricultural School, Truro, N. S.:
The annual closing exercises of the
School of Agriculture will take place
about the middle of next month, (Oct.)
They will be of an unusually interesting
character this year. Hence I take this
early opportunity of calling your readers
attention to it. I will send you the
complete programme in time for the
next issue.
There are five students in the gradu-
ating class this year. And our attendance
has been larger by far than ever before.
Eleven counties have contributed these
students. Cape Breton, Inverness and
Richmond forming the extreme eastern
counties, while Annapolis and Lunenburg
are the two most western counties, which
have students here. We have had
students from New Brunswick and
this winter will probably have some
from Ontario.
The arm crops this year have been
excellent in spite of the unfavorable
spring. Many interesting and instructive
experiments have been conducted.
The result in some cases I think will be
of immense value to our farmers. The
success or value of an experiment can
not always be measured by the tons of
grass or bushels of grain which is pro-
duced, but when as we had this season,
grass seed sown about the middle of
June which has already been harvested
and produced three tons of cured hay to
the acre, it promises results of great
value. We have had other experiments
which are equally valuable. I shall dis-
cuss some of these more interesting ex-
periments at the closing of the school.
The Theses of the students are upon
subjects of great importance to our farm-
ers and are based on investigations con-
ducted by the students. Other interest
