A BUSINESS AT HARDING POINT.

On Saturday, about 5 p.m., a most graceful and brutal row occurred on the premises of Mr. George Harding, Harding's farm on the St. John, opposite Westfield railway station.

As there was there has been a difficulty of long standing between Harding and his neighbors the Clark family. The latter consists of Mr. James Clark, senior, her two daughters, Jane and Mary, of mature years, and a son, Robert, who is a young man. The dispute arose over the marriage of Mrs. James Clark, and she, needless disputes about land and fences and cattle have led to constant bickerings between the Hardings and Clarks, and on Saturday afternoon, the matter came to a head. It is probable will probably result in old Mr. Clark's death at the hands of George Harding.

The following deposition was made by the victim of the dispute, before John W. Cavell Esq., J. P., yesterday morning, at Mr. George Harding's Point:

"I am GEORGE H. HARDING, ANK CLARK."

"On the 9th inst. I and my daughter went milking in the afternoon. George Harding and my daughter were disputing, and I saw that they were going to fight. I intervened, and I went forward to save my daughter, whom I knew no more until the doctor was stitching up the cut on my head."

ANX CLARK.

Harding's Point, King's Co., Nov. 9, 1879.

This brief statement conveys a very imperfect idea of what actually occurred.

Mrs. Clark and her daughters had been milking in a field near Harding's house. From the house, Mr. Harding called to them, and entering the yard attached to his house and sheds, Harding's wood house is annexed to his house, and he appears to have met the eldest Miss Clark (who was in advance of the others). She asked him if he was the object of the visit of the woman was to see Harding who he had housed some of their cows a few days before. A serious wrangle ensued at once arose, the respective parties claiming the right of way. The contention continued between Harding and his wife and a servant girl, named Adams, on the side, and the three Clark women on the other. Finally Harding struck Mrs. Clark—the says with a stick, and she fell down. Then he turned to his daughter, Miss Clark ran to help her daughter, when Harding attacked the old woman with the gun, the first blow being on the left side of the neck and of sufficient force to break the gun barrel on the ground. He then fired a second shot down he struck her a second blow with the gun barrel on the right side of the head. The daughters say he then struck her on the shoulders and chest when she tried to rise. One of the daughters attempted to assist her mother, when she was attacked by Mrs. Harding and the servant girl. The younger sister, Mary, fled from the scene, calling "murder," and returned to her home. When she was again returned from the city in his boat, she found her father lying dead on the ground, having been killed in his hand, but she succeeded in recovering the body. 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WHAT DOES IT MEAN?—Ottawa grants stated that Sir John A. Macdonald was him to England a number papers relating to militia matters which intended to submit to the Imperial Government. It was stated, but rather obscurely, that a reorganization of the Canadian militia is not probable. Sir Mich Hicks Beach, the Colonial Secretary, agreed to the Canadian riflemen at Wimbledon said:

"I can assure you that there is but one policy in this country, whatever differences party politics may exist, in the affection for God which unite the Dominion of Canada with those of the United Kingdom, nothing can be more effectually carried out than by the maintenance of our militia.
