

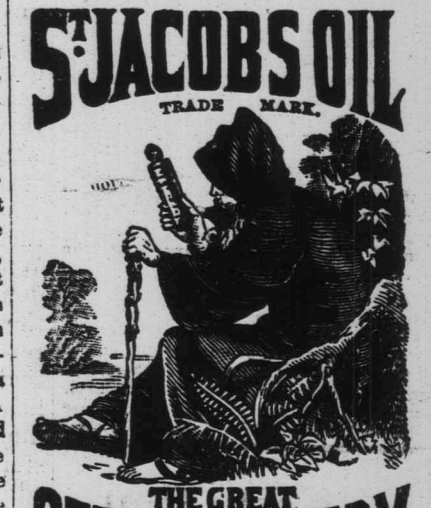

remaining at the same price, \$1.00 per
bbl. Turnips are from 80 cents to one
dollar. Cabbage from 50 to 60 cents
per dozen heads. Carriage herring in
lowering, ranging from \$4.00 to \$4.50
per barrel. Oats from 40 to 43 cents
per bushel. Cow Bay herring are \$4.50
per barrel.

Collision in the Harbour.
While the pilot boat "Two Brothers"
was lying at anchor opposite Haviland's
ferry on Monday morning about 4 a. m.,
she was run into by one of Stewart &
Co.'s woodboats loaded with deal. By
the collision the "Two Brothers" had
her bow sprit carried away, her
patent windlass broken and other dam-
age amounting to about \$100. Her crew
were asleep at the time, but owing to the
lights being extinguished—perhaps by the
collision—when the crew came on deck

Fatal Accident at Moncton.

Roads muddy.
Weather disagreeable.
The election has caused a little excite-
ment.
Get your flower beds secured for the
approaching frost.
Shop breakers are operating almost
every night in Toronto and Montreal, and
the police don't catch them worth a cent.
The chairman of the Port Huron
Relief Committee has announced that no
further contributions in aid of Michigan
fire sufferers are needed.
The small farmer in Germany cannot
hold their own. Nearly 4,000 farms
were offered for sale last year, and 1,000
found no purchasers.
One hundred and seventy-five lives
are supposed to have been lost by the
foundering of a Dutch passenger steamer
in the Indian ocean.
The potato crop is a failure in Nor-
thumberland County this year. Some
parties are not digging more than three
barrels for one barrel of seed.
The body of Lemuel Taylor, one of
the Indians drowned on Oct. 17, was
found on the shore yesterday morning.
The other body is not yet recovered.

LOCAL MATTERS

We are sorry to hear that our re-
spected friend George Fowle, Esq., of
Glenside Parish, has met with a sad
bereavement. He buried a 12 year old
son on Monday, and today his wife will
be interred at 2 p. m.

We are requested to state that smelt
fishing will commence the 15th Nov.
next, instead of 1st December, as for-
merly. Northern counties do so likewise.

The United States consuls to Germany
report that the recent discoveries of
petroleum there are likely to interfere
seriously with the export of petroleum to
Europe.

Over 2,000,000 sheep have been
sheared this year in the State of Michi-
gan, and the clip of wool amounts, by
official figures, to 10,774,163 pounds, or
nearly 5 1-4 pounds per head.

One of the outcomes of the recent
disastrous fire at a Philadelphia factory,
by which so many lives were lost, is a
suit for fifty thousand dollars' damages
brought by the parents of one of the vic-
tims against the owners and operators of
the establishment.

Rev. Mr. Robinson, and wife, from
Tabusintac, were in town yesterday. They
were unfortunate enough to be thrown
out of their vehicle whilst driving around
Tortyburn corner. It was a great mis-
hap, the roads were in such a bad state.

A wool and wheat grower says:—
"It is my belief that the real reason why our
wheat crops only yield half as much as
the English crops is that in England farm-
ers utilize sheep as grain growers, while
we only consider them wool and mutton
makers."

The Irish Times states that a com-
pany is being formed, with a capital of
about \$15,000,000, at the head of which
will be a member of the royal family,
for the purpose of purchasing waste
lands in Ireland, to be reclaimed
and let or sold to tenants for cultivation
on easy terms.

The British Board of Customs is en-
deavouring to prevent the introduction of
the Colorado beetle into England. A
fruit has been seized by the rumor that
Irishmen in the West were gathering
potato beetles and securing them in small
boxes for transportation to England,
where they were to be turned loose to
prey upon English crops.

Captain Howgate who is charged with
defrauding the United States Government
of ninety thousand dollars in connection
with the Arctic exploratory expedition
bearing his name, failed to appear in
court at Washington on Friday last to
answer to the charge, whereupon his
bondsmen were made liable for the
amount of his bail, forty thousand dol-
lars.

Four African expeditions are about to
be undertaken simultaneously. Their
explorations will be conducted upon sepa-
rate lines, but the four parties hope to
meet at the end of their perils. For
the purpose of sending news to Europe
the expeditions will take with them about
five thousand carrier pigeons.

The Michigan Legislature at its last
session appropriated \$1,000 for experi-
ments in ensilage and the culture of sugar
corn at the State Agricultural Col-
lege. The season was somewhat late,
but corn for ensilage was at once sown,
and the silo has just been filled, samples
of the fodder being subjected to careful
chemical tests before being put into the
silos, which will be repeated when it is
taken out for feeding, for the purpose
of noting any chemical changes that may
take place in it, and making a more
complete theoretical determination of the
value of the new system of feeding.

Newgate Prison, one of the old
landmarks of London, is to be pulled
down. Clerkenwell Prison will become
in future the central lock-up for London
manufacturers, and the courts of law, which
comprise what is known as the Old Bailey,
will be enlarged so as to cover the space
now occupied by the prison. It was a
hideous object, black with smoke, though
only just a century old, and a decided
disfavour to a great thoroughfare. It
was built by Danes in 1782, just after
the Gordon riots, who had but one idea,
to make it impregnable. In its front
many noted criminals swung here
Thislewood exclaimed, "I shall soon
know the last great secret," and Fauntleroy,
before his fall, communicated the
secret of where to buy the best Car-
acas.
