THE SESSION.

The Legislature has been nearly four weeks in session. During that time a considerable amount of work has been done.

Hon. Mr. McLeod has displayed admirable qualities of leadership. His position must be held to them. Notwithstanding his advanced age, he is still full of vigor.

The future duration of the session will, no doubt, depend in a great measure on the course pursued by the Opposition.

HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

The annual report of the Trustees and Superintendent of the Hospital for the Insane, shows the number of inmates in the Hospital on the 1st January, 1889, was 122.

Twenty-four males and twenty-nine females had been admitted, making a total number under treatment 175.

Eight deaths have occurred, due to the following causes, viz: Three from consumption; two from apoplexy; one from diarrhoea; one from enteritis; and one from exhaustion of acute mania.

During the past year part of the Administration Building occupied by the Medical Superintendent, was fitted up for a ward for female patients, and a special ward for the insane.

A novel way of endeavoring to obtain a shortening of the hours of labor in workshops was recently tried in Liverpool, England.

Mr. H. C. McDonald undertook to enlighten the House regarding the length of time an elector should be in possession of property to enable him to vote.

When the House was in committee on Thursday night last on the bill respecting the election of members of the Legislature, several members of the Opposition, in their anxiety to make a point against the Government, were heard to exclaim.

Mr. Bell delivered one of his characteristic orations. He had considerable to say relative to the multiplication of votes just before an election.

Mr. Peter's said he knew from experience as a former candidate for election in Charlottetown that considerable buying of votes had taken place in the past.

When the House was in committee on Friday night on the same bill, the debate grew somewhat warm, and by no means uninteresting.

Hon. Mr. McLeod said he thought it strange that the Hon. member (Mr. Bell) should waste so much of the time of the committee repeating a speech he had delivered immediately before the House.

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CANADA'S RIGHTS AND ALIEN LABOR.

The report of the committee regarding alien labor, says the Toronto Empire, should be the subject of Parliament's attention to this subject, and to have the grievance justly complained of brought thoroughly into public view.

Here is the case in a nutshell: Under a most harsh interpretation of a restrictive law Canadian workmen living at various points along the border have been driven from their work because it happened to be a Sunday.

The Canadian organs of the surrender to Washington, when not posing as free traders, ask our people to subject themselves to these onerous war taxes.
