THE order-in-council lately passed which increased the size of lobster to be taken from 8 1/2 to 10 1/2 inches until the year 1900 has been suspended. They may still be taken nine and a-half inches in length.

STAR POINTERS, the famous paper, holding the world's record of 1,094 was sold on Monday, in New York, to W. J. White of Cleveland for \$15,000 or \$600 less than he was sold for in 1897.

It has been decided by the Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, not to accept any of the tenders for the steamship service for carrying the British mails for two years from next May. New tenders will probably be called for.

STANLEY'S FIRST JUNGLE FIGHT.—Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, has written out the story of "My First Fight in the Jungle," and has given the manuscript to the Ladies' Home Journal which will publish it in the next number.

THE writer of Gladstone's biography, Mr. John Morley, is to receive two thousand dollars a year from the Macmillan's for the work. There are over one hundred thousand letters alone on file at Hawarden which will give some idea of the magnitude of the task.

A SAN FRANCISCO despatch of the 19th says the ship Atlanta, McBride, master, from Tacoma for Cape Town, with Alton Bay, Oregon, and that the vessel and cargo were a total loss. Twenty-eight of the crew were drowned.

THE death of Sir George Baden Powell took place on Sunday last. He had represented the Kirkcaldy division of Liverpool in parliament in the Conservative interest since 1885 and was an eminent political economist and authority on colonial affairs. He was in the fifty-fifth year of his age.

THE Halifax Herald says: The heavy shipments of potatoes made to Havana this fall have proved very profitable. Returns have been received showing the gross price to have been \$6.50 per barrel. This gives a splendid margin for the shippers.

AN interesting feature of the celebration of the jubilee of the Emperor of Austria will be the reading in the pulpits of the empire on the 27th inst., of a pastoral letter signed by the whole Austrian episcopate. In it the fifty years reign of the Emperor is reviewed and the hope expressed that the Austrian peoples may be reconciled on that day.

A GAME of football between the teams of St. Dunstan's College and Prince of Wales College, took place on the G. A. A. grounds on Saturday afternoon last. In consequence of the rain, the grounds were slippery; but this did not deter the players from entering with vim into the game. The result was 29 for St. Dunstan's, to 1 for Prince of Wales.

THE new piece of railway constructed at North Wiltshire, to straighten the loop, was formally opened on Monday forenoon. A Special train with Superintendent Shepley and several officials of the road and some others left the city at 9 o'clock. The engine conveying the train with the Superintendent private car attached passed over the new track, to the discharge of torpedoes and the blowing of the whistle. The new work cost about \$25,000. It is a mile long and saves about three-fifths of a mile.

WHEN a party of the British royal artillery was engaged in moving the mountings of a ten-inch angle gun, which is to be erected in what is known as the Devil's Spay Glass battery, Gibraltar, on Monday, the huge mechanism overbalanced and bowled down the side of the rock, gaining speed as it descended. It crossed the tracks of the railroad, which were fortunately clear at the time, and finally imbedded itself in some soft ground beyond. Had it travelled a few yards to the left the lunatic asylum and other less substantial buildings would have been considerably damaged.

EARLY on Sunday morning the alarm was sounded, when a fire was discovered in the store of J. B. McDonald & Co., Queen Street. It is evident the fire had been smouldering for some time; as the shop was filled with smoke when the firemen arrived on the scene. After some time the fire was located in a large pile of clothing in the centre of the store, under an arc light, a spark from which is supposed to have been the cause. A great quantity of water was applied and by the time the fire was completely quenched, nearly all the goods in the store were ruined. Mr. McDonald estimates the loss at \$10,000 partially covered by insurance. Mr. McDonald has been singularly unfortunate in the matter of fires: It will be remembered that only a few years ago his premises on Queen Street were completely burned.
