

The Sick Room.
Never put a patient into a room that is dark and gloomy; let it be light and cheerful with a fireplace if possible. If the illness be feverish, other sickness requiring quiet, a back room away from the family will answer best. The patient will not care to look at anything or to talk much and quiet is necessary. If he should be suffering from an accident he should be placed near the family where he can be spoken to often. This will keep him cheerful and contented, and it will often save time in waiting on him. Never have the window fastened so it cannot be opened, especially from the top.

There should be little furniture in the room if the disease be infectious. It is better to have no curtains at all, but if the room looks bare use light goods which will easily wash. As wooden articles hold odors a long time use cane-bottom or plain wood chairs. In case of accident the bed may be placed where the patient feels most comfortable, only it should be where there is a good light to see and dress the wounds, but in fever let it be between the door and the fire-place. The reason for this is that as the fire cannot burn without air there must be a draught to feed it, and as it becomes heated and rushes up the chimney, it is replaced by a fresh supply drawn in through the door and window. In this way the impurities of the room are carried away and the disease is kept from spreading. So if a person stands between the bed and fire-place he must get the air after it has been contaminated by passing over the patient. Whereas on the other side, between the bed and door, he breathes the pure air. A smoky chimney may often be remedied by holding a lighted piece of paper a little way up the flue, this heats the air and causes it to ascend.

When the bed clothes require changing and the patient cannot get up, roll the clothes to be changed tightly to the middle lengthwise; put on the clean things with half the width rolled up close to the other roll, lift the patient on one of the newly made part, slip of the clothes has just been lifted from, and unroll the clean ones.

An authority on the subject says that there are five qualifications necessary to become a nurse. "Sobriety, cleanliness, firmness, gentleness and patience." Good nursing and judicious attention are required as much as medicine. Allow no liquid to stand for a moment uncovered. All medicines should be kept out of sight except at the time of administering them. Diapers, napkins, clothing and everything used should be kept clean. Allow no visitor to stay longer than five minutes, unless the patient is suffering from a slight accident and cannot be hurt by talking. Never contradict, argue or irritate a sick person; let him alone, except when he needs attention.

Keep no strong scented flowers near the sick bed, but if they are placed there during the day always remove them at night. It is always best to have the flowers of a deep color, as people with delicate imaginations are often very sensitive in regard to a preponderance of white blossoms. All peculiarities of the sick should be carefully studied, for the best of physicians can do but little to alleviate disease if not aided by a good nurse.
