A TERRIBLE TALE OF **POVERTY AND HUNGER** 

Between Forty and Fifty Families in Quarry Districts Near Sandusky, Ohio, Are Said to be at the Verge of Death.

Sandusky, Ohio, Dec. 27-Clothed in rags and living in wretched hovels, devoid of food and fuel, between forty and fifty families including nearly two hundred young children are reported to be in danger of actual death from starvation in the quarry districts near here. They are the wives and children of quarrymen who have been out of work for months.




