Coun cillor Mullaly then 'phoned Secretary Slattery and asked him whether h was aware of what was going on. He replied that he knew that the building was being erected and that permis sion had been given by Senior Coun cillor Martin, who had consulted with Engineer Ryan. It was a case o emergency, said the Secretary, an therefore a meeting had not been called. Councillor Mullaly said that would have been an easy matter call a meeting in an hour or two, an he questioned the right of Senior Councillor Martin and Engineer Rya to do what they had done. Councillo Mullaly then said over the 'phone: "Are you aware that the residents are protesting?"

The reply came back:

"Yes, I am. Let them protest." Later on in the day Mr. Williams who also resides in the locality where the shed is being put up, called or Councillor Mullaly and accused him of not looking out for the welfare of the citizens, inasmuch as he (Mr. M.) was allowing a smallpox hospital to be erected in their midst. Councillo Mullaly said, "I did not agree to i and knew nothing about it. Get up petition protesting against its going up. I am behind you." Councillor Mullaly saw Mr. Kent, M.H.A., in the afternoon, who said to him, "Yes, know all about it. A petition is being signed to be handed to me, and as soon as I get it I shall place it in Councillor Martin's hands." Councillor Mullaly then called on Councillors Channing, Ryan and Myrick. They said they knew nothing of what was going on and realized that they had been ignored. Councillor Channing suggested a meeting to-night. He thereupon wrote a requisition for a meeting: It was signed by himself Councillors Mullaly and Myrick. At 5.30 Councillor Channing called at the City Council and met the Secretary there, "Be on hand, Mr. Slattery; he said; "there will be a meeting tonight at 9 o'clock."
