

Row in Council Over the Hospital Shed

A meeting must be held to-night, said Councilor Channing to Secretary J. L. Slattery, last evening. Mr. Slattery, who has such a long experience of the way of Councilors smiled and said that he did not think there would be a meeting because a notice of 24 hours was needed in order to notify the members; and second, he himself was not expecting a meeting and had an important appointment. And as it turned out, Mr. Slattery was right. There was no meeting. Knowing that the storm centre of this trouble was somewhere in the vicinity of Councilor Mullaly, the Telegram sought him out and got the following version of the affair, which shows that he was not as usual, "doing nothing," as our contemporary put it this morning. Councilor Mullaly is one of those who does not lie on his oars where there is civic trouble. In fact he visited the site of the hospital shed last Sunday and seeing that it was in the city limits and knowing that permission had not been granted for its erection, he intended to enquire about it next morning. Mr. Major, who lives in the vicinity, waited on him Monday morning and protested against the hospital being built there and said that the neighbors were indignant. Councilor Mullaly said he knew nothing about it. He advised Mr. Major to see Mr. J. M. Kent and other members of the district of St. John's East and to get the residents to sign a protest. Councilor Mullaly then phoned Secretary Slattery and asked him whether he was aware of what was going on. He replied that he knew that the building was being erected and that permission had been given by Senior Councilor Martin, who had consulted with Engineer Ryan. It was a case of emergency, said the Secretary, and therefore a meeting had not been called. Councilor Mullaly said that it would have been an easy matter to call a meeting in an hour or two, and he questioned the right of Senior Councilor Martin and Engineer Ryan to do what they had done. Councilor Mullaly then said over the phone: "Are you aware that the residents are protesting?"

The reply came back: "Yes, I am. Let them protest." Later on in the day Mr. Williams, who also resides in the locality where the shed is being put up, called on Councilor Mullaly and accused him of not looking out for the welfare of the citizens, inasmuch as he (Mr. M.) was allowing a small hospital to be erected in their midst. Councilor Mullaly said, "I did not agree to it and knew nothing about it. Get up a petition protesting against its going up. I am behind you." Councilor Mullaly saw Mr. Kent, M.H.A., in the afternoon, who said to him, "Yes, I know all about it. A petition is being signed to be handed to me, and as soon as I get it I shall place it in Councilor Martin's hands." Councilor Mullaly then called on Councilors Channing, Ryan, and Myrick. They said they knew nothing of what was going on and realized that they had been ignored. Councilor Channing suggested a meeting to-night. He thereupon wrote a requisition for a meeting. It was signed by himself, Councilors Mullaly and Myrick. At 5.30 Councilor Channing called at the City Council and met the Secretary there. "Be on hand, Mr. Slattery," he said; "there will be a meeting to-night at 9 o'clock."

Meetings were evidently far away from Mr. Slattery's mind. "There is a custom," he said, "that a notice of 24 hours is necessary to have the members summoned."

"Is it in the rules?" said Councilor Channing.

"No," said Secretary Slattery; "but it is an old custom."

"We must have this meeting," repeated Councilor Channing, "as the emergency demands it."

"I don't think so," replied the Secretary. "And besides, I myself have an important engagement."

"Now, Mr. Slattery, understand me," said Councilor Channing, going towards the door; "meeting must be held to-night."

With that he left abruptly and went over the stairs. The last words of

Ottawa Has Epidemics.

OTTAWA, To-Day.

The sanitary conditions here bid fair to bring about an early proration. Typhoid Fever has been followed by Diphtheria and Smallpox. The latter disease is so prevalent that compulsory vaccination will probably be ordered. Since January 1,200 cases of typhoid have been reported. Sixty-four deaths have occurred. Fifty-two smallpox patients are at Porter's Island and many others in the city. Charles Blue, the official stenographer of the house committees, is a victim, and yesterday the sessional messenger became a suspect. The conditions of such an epidemic may terminate the session abruptly.

Rebels Capture Guns.

AGUA, PRIETA, Mexico, To-Day.

The most important battle of the Mexican revolution, thus far, was fought here yesterday, between the Federals, commanded by Lieut. Col. Diaz, and the rebels under Garcia. It resulted in the repulse of the former. Two Federal machine guns fell into the possession of the rebels. The Federals sustained a loss estimated by the rebels at 200 killed. The rebels gave their own loss as 20.
