Valuable Mail **OUR ANNUAL CHRISTMAS** Destroyed When Mail Car Takes Fire by Explosion of Lamp. A serious accident occurred shortly before 1 a.m. yesterday to the mail car of the express in charge of Conductor Penny, which left here at 6 p. m. Saturday, we learn from passengers who arrived here by the express last night. The express was proceed-ing along near Camp 4 between Tic-kle Harbour and Long Harbour when suddenly one of the lamps in the mail car fell from the ceiling, exploded and scattered burning oil all over the compartment. The mails bags about with their contents, of course, furnished most inflammable material for the fire which soon enveloped the whole car. The train ran in on the siding and the burning mail car was quickly incoupled and was burned to the trucks with practically all its con-tents in less than a half hour. When the accident occurred a fierce gale of N. W. wind blew and Mailman Cashman and Baggaeman Doody with the conductor and other train hands and passengers attempted to $g \in t$ out the mails, but the car in a few minutes was a seething furnace and only ouple of bags were secured. The mail officer had all his clothing destroyed in the fire. There was no water near but $\epsilon v \epsilon n$ if there was the train hands believe that the car could not be saved. Two safes which contained several thousands of dollars were re-moved from the burning car, rakes from the engine being used to grapple them and haul them out of the car. All the express packages shipped by the Reid Nfld. Steamer Damaged

AND SHORT OF COAL. The tramp steamer Chester, Capt. Segebaith, put into port yesterday dis-abled and short of coal. She was 18 days out from Antwerp bound to New York in Water ballast. Shortly after leaving Antwerp strong head winds were experienced and the ship being light in ballast was knocked about badly; huge seas swept her decks and slight damage was sustained. On Thursday evening last during the height of the hurricane and blizzard the Chester's pressure cylinder, and main steam pipe gave out. The great-est care then had to be exercised in navigating the ship while temporary repairs were made to the machinery. Coal was beginning to run short and the captain decided to come to St. John's to replenish her supply. The Chester is a three-master, 2,568 tons gross and 1,637 tons nett. All her working gear and funnel is situated aft. She is owned by the American Petroleum Company. Bowring Bros. are agents, Consul Cook supplying and the Reid Nfid. Co. repairing damages. Capt. Segebarth was here twentythree years ago as chief officer on the S. S. LaFlandre which put in here in a battered condition.

The S. S. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here from the Northward at 8.30 last evening bringing a full car-go of 3.000 packages of fish, oil, etc. The ship had a stormy trip going north with gales from the N. and N. W., snow and intense frost. Thursday and that night the ship was at Fogo and one of the worst storms witness-ed for years prevailed. Coming south the weather was more civil and all ports of call were made. The ship was short of coal yesterday morning and barely made Catalina after the bunkers had been swept out to keep up steam; this was owing to the ough weather which impeded her orogress. She got a supply of coal at Tatalina. She brought along 22 passengers including Capt. Bishop, Dr. Jameson, Jesse Hann and several others in saloon.

Bicycles in British Army.

Some 3,000 Wheels Used in Recent Manoeuvres—Found of Great Use.

The recent manoeuvres of the Britsh army, conducted on a larger scale than ever before in times of peace, has brought the bicycle into fovarable otice, and the probability is that that ehicle will be given an important standing. With good roads, such as are found throughout England, the bicycle has demonstrated its reliabilty and utility. Some 3,500 of these yclists were attached to the cavalry nd the rapid movement of that large ody was surprising to most people. It is conceded that the bicycle would be no substitute for horses in a battle charge, though the destruction possible with two or three thousand motor-cycles at full speed would certainly cause some confusion, especially if the riders were protected with steel shields. The direction of a cycle com-mand would require specially train-ed officers; in fact, the French have ad the subject under conside for some time. A combination of mo-tor cycles and bicycles will not unlikely be the final outcome, for one likely be the final outcome, for one motor-cycle can tow four or five mounted bicycles over ordinarily good and level roads at a speed of fifteen or twenty miles an hour. For distance of, say, up to thirty miles, a motor-bicycle regiment could be transferred to emergency points in far less time than by railway, even assuming that the railway were con-venient for loading and unloading.----H.
