Conscription.

A great agitation is being carried on in England in favor of conscription. The most prominent of the newspapers favoring its adoption are the Times and the Daily Mail, while the radical press the Daily News in London and the Manchester Guardian in the provinces are opposed to it. According to the London Globe, a majority of the Coalition Cabinet favor it, and that majority includes the Unionist Lord Curzon, the Liberal Winston Churchill, and the Radical Lloyd George. The most prominent of the anti's include Liberals like Asquith, Grey, Harcourt, and the Unionist, Balfour. The most significant statement of all is that Lord Kitchener is undecided, and that his pronouncement, either one way or the other, will have a deciding effect on Cabinet, Parliament and people. The significance of the statement lies not in the accuracy of the declaration that the Secretary of War is undecided, for we do not credit that avowal, but in the light it throws on his attitude. It shows that he has kept silent while the controversy has been raging, and that the judgment of the man who has a genius for making armies has not yet been given. He has taken no part in the agitation for or against conscription, and has been giving the voluntary system a fair trial, and withal he has worked wonders with it. When Great Britain entered the war, while she placed her unrivalled naval force at the disposal of her allies, and thus prevented the destruction of French shipping, the annihilation of the French Navy and the devastation of the Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts of France, she did not undertake to contribute to the land forces of her allies more than about 120,000 men. But she has done far more. Her casualties alone double the amount of her undertaking, and to-day she has more than a million soldiers in the different theatres of war and in training or reserve another two million soldiers. Speaking generally some three million men have been enlisted since the declaration of war under the voluntary system. The voluntary system has called for adjustment. In some districts, coal mining and engineering, enlistment has been curtailed by the authorities and soldiers have been sent back from the trenches and training camps to work in the mines and the munition factories, where their services would be more beneficial to the conduct of the war. From the first days of the war, Kitchener has been insistent on his forecast that the war would be a long one and that he must call for more and more men, and at intervals he has made it plain that he is not yet satisfied that the response to his several calls have been inadequate. Volunteering or conscription can only bring men together. A multitude of such men is but a mob. That mob has to be organized, equipped with clothing and
