Prompt Action Needed.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—I am receiving letters
from parents in this Dominion ex-
plaining that their sons in Canada—
chiefly around Sydney—are being
conscripted, or are liable to conscrip-
tion, under the Canadian Military
Service Act, 1917, and asking me to
procure exemption for these sons,
frequently upon the grounds known
as (B) and (C) in our local Act—
that brothers have served or are serv-
ing in His Majesty's Forces.

I have to explain to my corre-
spondents, as I wish to here, for a
wider circle, that grounds (B) and
(C) in our Act have no counter-part
in the Canadian Act, and, therefore,
that their sons in Canada cannot get
exemption there on these grounds.

I have, however, in one or two
cases, been instrumental in getting
exemptions in Sydney, through a
legal friend of mine, on other
grounds, and I am willing to give
such aid as I can in any cases which
seem to me to be really deserving.
I take this opportunity to suggest
to our Government the situation of
Newfoundlanders whose homes are in
this Dominion, and who have gone
to Canada to work temporarily. In-
asmuch as their labour has in the
main been sought for such essential
occupations as mining or steel manu-
facturing, and a refusal to allow
them to go to Canada would at the
time they went have been consid-
ered churlish, they ought, perhaps, to
be allowed to continue their work,
and not be conscripted. If not, they
should be allowed to come here. They
ought, in any case, to be given the
same right to exemption as they
would have here, and given a chance,
if subject to conscription, or saying
whether they would join our Regi-
ment or the Canadian Forces.

This should at once be the subject
of diplomatic action, and I cannot
conceive that any real difficulty
would be experienced in arriving at
a satisfactory conclusion.

Germany Watching Newfoundland.

Germany has been watching New-
foundland for many years past. The
strategic position of the Island, stand-

speakable Hun the answer of New-
foundland to the country's call for
subscriptions to this Loan. Make

at those enemies of Freedom. Money will

when the end comes, you will be con-
firmed in the thought that in at least

German People Realize THE DECEIT OF THE HIGH COM- MAND.

Geneva, June 18.—The enthusiasm
created by the first German offensive
has passed and a feeling of profound
deception reigns among the German
people, according to an interview
with a neutral diplomat who has just
arrived in Geneva from Berlin, in La
Suisse. The people at home ex-
pected a quick victory from the early
reports in the official bulletins and,
above all, a quick peace. The prin-
cipal question asked in Berlin last
week was: "Have we entered Paris?"
The economic situation in the inter-
ior of Germany, the diplomat declar-
ed, is becoming more and more seri-
ous. Germans, both military and civil-
ian, now realize and virtually ad-
mit that the constant arrival of fresh
American troops will turn the tide of
the war.

The diplomat concluded his inter-
view with a statement that during a
recent sitting of the Reichstag the
question of autonomy for Alsace-Lor-
raine was discussed officially for the
first time since the beginning of the
war.

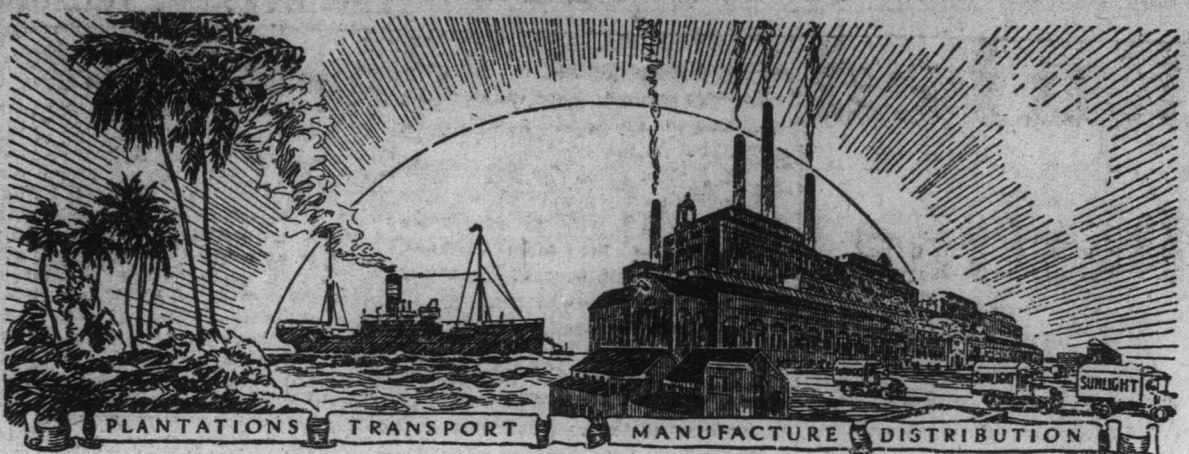
Household Notes.

Use as few appliances in the kit-
chen as possible, but be sure that
each of them is really labor-saving.
Every housewife should serve po-
tatoes at least twice a day while the
wheat shortage lasts.
All leftover bottles should be saved,
cleaned and the juices from fresh
fruits put in them.

Whereas the Government of
this Dominion and the Muni-
cipal Council of the City of St.
John's have arranged for the
engagement of a Community
Nurse for service in the said
city during the next three
months, especially with refer-
ence to the saving of infant
life;
And whereas it is necessary
that such Nurse should get at
once into touch with all newly
born infants and their mothers;
on recommendation of the
Acting Medical Health Officer,
it is ordered that in respect of
the City of St. John's the pro-
visions of Section 8, Cap. 28,
Consolidated Statutes, as
amended by Section 4, Cap. 9,
1899, will be enforced. This
Act provides that when any
birth takes place information
of the same shall be furnished
or posted within forty-eight
hours thereafter to the proper
officer appointed to receive the
same, under a fine not exceed-
ing \$10 for every neglect to do
so.

The obligation to furnish
such information rests in the
first instance upon the father
of the child; or, in the case of
his death or absence, upon the
mother; or, in the case of the
inability of both parents, then
successively upon any person
standing in their place, the
nurse in attendance, or the oc-
cupier of the house within
which the birth occurs.
As the Office of the Registrar
General is situated in St. John's,
it is ordered that the notifica-
tion of all births in the City of
St. John's from 1st July next
shall be furnished or posted
within forty-eight hours there-
after to the Registrar General
of Births, Marriages and
Deaths, 263 Duckworth Street,
upon cards which may be pro-
cured from any Post Office or
Postal Telegraph Office in the
City. Such cards when filled in
and signed may be mailed free
of charge.

It is not intended that the
notification of births as set
forth above shall interfere with
the reporting of births for re-
gistration at present carried
out by the Clergymen, who will
still continue such registration,
transmitting a correct copy of
the same to the Registrar Gen-
eral as usual.
