



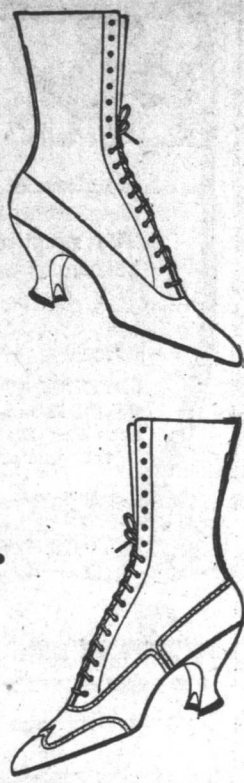

Geneva.—The inhabitants of the  
Swiss village of Martigny, face the  
prospect of being able to drink only  
wine and beer for some time, the re-  
sult of the town water works being  
washed away by the flood which  
swept through the Chamonix Valley,  
caused by the bursting of a glacier  
pocket. The flood is now receding  
but it will be many weeks before the  
water works can be rebuilt. The  
damage done through the valley to-  
tals many millions of francs but no  
lives were lost.

### Shipwrecked Nfld. Crew

AT NORTH SYDNEY.

Six shipwrecked sailors, the crew  
of the schooner Clarence A. Moulton,

Montreal, where they were taken by  
the ship which picked them up. The  
following is the list of the sailors:—

suddenly caught fire while on her way  
to France. Every effort was made to  
quench the blaze, but it was of no

and subsequently landed in Montreal.  
The men are at present at a lodging  
place in town, and will return to their  
homes in Newfoundland on the next

### IMPROVING BOTWOOD TERMIN-

US.—Quite a lot of improvements in  
the shipping facilities at Botwood  
have recently been made. New piers  
and stores have been erected, new  
rails are being laid, and when finish-  
ed, this will be one of our best ship-  
ping ports. The work is being rushed  
to completion before the close of  
navigation. Last week the Alconia  
and Cranley with 5,000 tons of pulp  
and paper each were loaded by the  
A.N.D. Co., whilst the Rose Castle  
discharged 10,000 tons coal.
