Prohibition in U. S. A.

ITS EFFECT ON SOCIETY.

Dear Sir,—I have not yet seen in any report of the Wesley Church Literary Association's debate on Prohibition as to whether the members decided on the respective merits of the Swedish system and the present Prohibition law. They seem to have evaded the points at issue and decided on something not in the scope of the debate. They ask for a bone-dry law with provision for legitimate medicinal purposes. The omission of sacramental purposes is noteworthy.

What they ask for is the enforcement of a bone-dry law. Now there is no question that the bone-dry laws of the United States are far ahead of ours as regards the power to apply them. The administration of the law is another matter. Sometimes it is actually impossible to enforce a law in which every loophole is effectually closed up. The proprietors of the Cosmopolitan Magazine have instructed a Mr. William G. Shepherd to investigate Prohibition in the United States. The first of a series of articles by that gentleman appears in the December number of the Cosmopolitan. Judging from the article one would say that Mr. Shepherd has leanings towards prohibition, and he minimizes the evils as much as possible and looks forward to the eventual success of Prohibition. The facts stated in his article "Who's Drinking in America?" are startling, to say the least. Our own state of lawlessness is bad enough in all conscience, but we have not yet added murder to the crimes of theft, smuggling and moonshining. Mr. Shepherd asks "Why don't we have Prohibition in the United States?" It is noteworthy how the progress of Prohibition in the United States followed on the same lines as in Newfoundland.

Increased Pensions.

CANADIAN SCALE WILL BE ENFORCED.

The Prime Minister yesterday informed a deputation from the G.W.V.A. Executive that the Canadian Scale of Pensions would be enforced here after January 1st, 1922. The Prime Minister was met at his office at noon yesterday by President Higgins and other members of the G.W.V.A. Executive who desired to discuss the claims of the returned men as regards the matter of pensions. Besides the Prime Minister the Hon. S. J. Foote, Dr. Barnes, G. Shea and W. W. Hallyard were present. Hon. Dr. Campbell, Hon. H. J. Brownrigg and Hon. W. F. Coaker being out of town, and the Minister of Justice on business in England. The conference lasted for one hour and a half. President Higgins placing the claims of the Veterans before the Government, and reading resolutions sent in from all parts of the country supporting the Association in their demands. After the discussion the Prime Minister gave the deputation a guarantee that the drop balance would be paid immediately. This balance was left over on June 30th last, and was transferred by the Auditor General to the special revenue. A special Minute of Council had now been passed, and

Ulster Will Not Yield One iota—Ghandi Inciting Indians to Turbulence—General Election in United Kingdom Possible.

BUSINESS IN CANADA. WINNIPEG, Nov. 11. Little change has taken place in Canadian business conditions during the past two weeks since the report of the Credit Men's Association.

DISORDERS IN ROME. ROME, Nov. 11. Four persons were killed and thirteen, including nine policemen, wounded in to-day's disorders between the fascisti and railway workers.

WAGES IN U.S. COAL FIELDS. HALIFAX, Nov. 11. The British Empire Steel Corporation and miners' representatives today agreed to extend the present wage schedule in the Nova Scotia coal fields from the expiry date November 30th to December 31st. Another conference will be held on December 15th, when it is hoped to effect a settlement covering another year.

K's SUCCESSOR. LONDON, Nov. 11. The result of the bye-election in Kewbury, vacant by the death of Kennedy Jones, was Viscount Ednam. Conservative son of Earl Dudley, 15,959; Leslie Burgin, Independent Liberal, 12,943. [Kennedy Jones, Coalition-Unionist, was returned unopposed at the last election.—Ed.]

THE RAINBOW OF PEACE. LONDON, Nov. 11. Lady Frances Balfour, presiding at a meeting representing four million women, which decided to send a message to the women of America expressing good will and hope for the success of the Washington Conference and "out of the rainbow of our hopes rests on Washington, the other side of our sister Isle of Erin."

CANADA'S FINANCES. OTTAWA, Nov. 11. The total debt of Canada on October 31st was \$2,329,268,902, a decrease of \$1,408,000 from the preceding month according to a statement issued by the Finance Department. The total revenue to October 31 this year was \$236,066,401, as compared with \$256,576,967 for the same period last year, the decrease being mainly due to a drop in customs revenue. The business profits tax totalled for the period \$11,135,000 as compared with \$26,889,000 last year, but the income tax amounted to \$64,235,800 compared with only \$7,297,000 last year.

CONFLICTING STATEMENTS. LONDON, Nov. 11. The India office has issued a statement that 900 Moplahs have surrendered, but a Calcutta telegram says the rebels are perpetrating excesses near Poona, whither crowds of refugees are hurrying. Wholesale murders and burnings of houses are reported, and troops and police are being rushed to the scene of outrages.

PRIVY COUNCIL JUDGMENT. LONDON, Nov. 11. The Privy Council to-day delivered a judgment holding the Board of Commerce and Combinations and fair prices acts of Canada ultra vires. The Board of Commerce ceased to function some time ago and the effect of the Privy Council decision on the Board's rulings, while it existed, remains to be seen. The legality of Boards created was contested by Price Bros., Quebec, when it attempted to fix the price of newspaper in Canada.

GOVERNMENT OF IRELAND ACT. LONDON, Nov. 11. November 22, has been fixed as the operative date to apply the financial provisions of the Government of Ireland Act in connection with the Administration of Justice and taxation, and all other services of local administration are to be in operation by

EARTHQUAKE RECORDED.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11. Two pronounced earthquakes were recorded on seismographs here between 2 and 4 o'clock this afternoon. The first disturbance was probably in South America.

GHANDI'S ACTIVITIES.

LAHORE, Nov. 11. Mahatma Ghandi, Indian Nationalist leader, urged a large gathering today to remove from the city the statue of Lord Lawrence, who distinguished himself in putting down the Sepoy mutiny. Ghandi urged his hearers to undertake the task even at the risk of imprisonment or death. Beneath the statue is the inscription, "Will you be governed by pen or by sword?"

THINKS WAR AHEAD.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11. The only way to prevent wars is to so prepare for defence that other nations will not want to fight, said General MacBrien, Chief of the Canadian general staff addressing the Canadian Club here. Six distinct wars were now raging he said and difficulties brewing between other nations precluded the idea of permanent peace.

ELECTION MUTTERING.

LONDON, Nov. 11. The possibility of general election is engaging attention, and an article in the Yorkshire Post, urging that Unionists by all past pledges are bound to support Ulster, if she refuses further concessions, has suggested that preparations for a break with Lloyd George are in train, but others doubt whether he is politically or physically able to lead a conservative secession against the whole influence of his former colleagues.

ULSTER'S MOTTO.

BELFAST, Nov. 11. Marquis Dufferin, Speaker of the Ulster Senate, addressing the Ulster Officers' Association to-day declared that Ulster would follow the old motto, "What I have I hold." Ulster, he added, would hang on to Ulster with teeth, hands and toes, because they owe this duty to the dead.
