Rosalind Tows Vessel Into Halifax.

HAD 1800 CASES WHISKEY ON BOARD.

Capt. James, of the s.s. Rosalind brings word that on the trip from New York to Halifax the ship sighted the three masted auxiliary schooner Dorin, disabled Monday morning, about 3 miles N.W. of Point Penant Buoy, which is twenty miles outside of Halifax. The schooner was flying signals of distress and the Red Cross liner at once bore down upon her. Capt. Coates asked to be towed to port. A boat was lowered with second officer Jackson in charge, and a light line was taken to the Loria. The placing of a hawser on board was accomplished with no little difficulty, as a heavy sea was running at the time. The job was done, however, and the disabled schooner was soon taken in tow. The Dorin, which reported being 111 days from Penarth, Wales, bound to St. Pierre with a cargo of liquor on board, had part of her sails blown away, her foremast under a physician's care. The Dorin was previously reported in distress by the steamship Murillo, which was bound South, and two steamers had been sent out from Halifax to search for her. She is practically a new vessel according to Capt. James, and is built of steel and is 406 tons gross. She is at present being held at Halifax by the Customs authorities pending instructions from Ottawa.
