The House met at 3 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

PRESENTING PETITIONS.

MR. CHAMBERS presented a petition on the subject of a wharf. The petition was supported by Mr. Walsh and Mr. Power.

NOTICE OF QUESTION.

MR. BROWNE gave notice of question.

THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND MINES, in reply to Mr. Halfyard, said he has no knowledge of any timber licenses on Labrador being granted by the Quebec Government. Answers to a couple of other questions on the order paper will be prepared by Monday.

ORDERS OF THE DAY.

Committee stage of the Bills relating to the Lobster Fishery and Fire Arms were deferred. The Bill "An Act to Provide for the Construction and Maintenance of Highways," passed Committee of the Whole and was ordered to be read a third time tomorrow (Monday).

The Bill to amend the War Pensions Act, 1922, was given second reading. The second reading of three other Bills was deferred.

When the House went into Committee of the Whole on the Highway Bill, Mr. Ashbourne took occasion to record his opposition to the scheme because of its not being substantial. He thought that this money should be spent in development of the fisheries. He dealt at some length on various branches of the fishery and expressed his surprise that more interest was not taken in the industry.

MR. K. BROWN, like his colleague, could not support the Bill and argued that it would be a step in the right direction to expend the money on existing roads. It would, he said, require \$200,000 to repair the roads in Twillingate District. Ten thousand dollars was needed for the repair of Burrows, Grand Falls Road, and it would take about \$35,000 to put the Badger, Hill's Bay Road in condition.

MR. GEO. GRIMES opposed the principle of the Bill and questioned if we were in a position to spend the required amount of money in this direction as it would take a long time before we saw any returns. The tourist traffic, he said, was a dream that all would like to see realized, and he suggested that if we are to get it going, we should spend a considerable amount on advertising in some of the large papers abroad.

THE PRIME MINISTER, replying to the three speakers that preceded him, said they had lost sight of the fact that the construction of highway was a capital investment which had to be made if we ever hope to develop a tourist traffic. Unless we embark on the enterprise from the start, it will never come. He firmly believed investment was a good one. All of the world countries are opened up to good roads. He had the greatest faith in the tourist policy and was prepared to stand by it.

MR. HIBBS expressed the opinion that we should have a better road policy than we had in the past 25 years. The Government had his sympathy

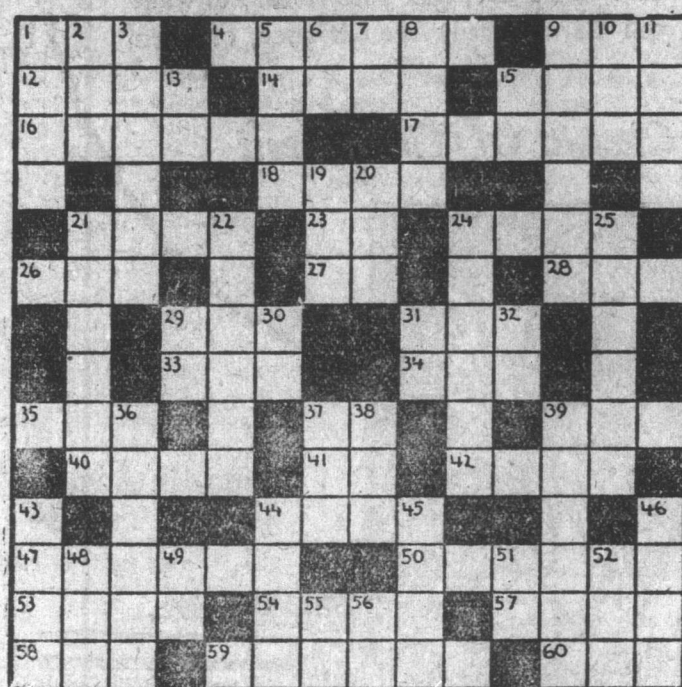
