Not long ago the Federation of British Industries addressed an illuminating document to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, pointing out the necesity of Britain collecting her dues from rance. But this is not all, for the very fact that France, Italy, and other debtor nations are not paying their debts, makes competition between these countries and Britain all the more keen, with the advantages very much on the side of those that do not now feel the necessity of balancing their national books and meeting their ob-

The iceberg loomed up suddenly out of a dense fog. It was only 100 or 150 feet from the ship. The Aurania's engines were quickly reversed when the iceberg was

Coyotes Destroy Sheep

VANCOUVER, B.C.-Sheep men the British Columbia interior report severe losses this year as a result of the depredations of coyotes, and trappers are being encouraged to make a more intensive drive on the prowlers. Coyote skins are of no value during the summer and trapping is, therefore, profitable only between the months of November and March, the bounty of \$2.00 a head being inadequate to meet the trappers' expenses. Good skins fetch from \$9.00 to \$16.00 in the market when they are in satisfactory condition and these prices make it well worth while for the trapper to go out. Five months out of twelve, however, is not, enough in which to check the increase of the marauders and sheep men are urging the British Columbia Government to acrease the bounty so that trappers will find it profitable to seek the coy
