The decision of the tribunal is a lengthy document. It begins with a recital of the formal language of the terms of the Treaty of Washington, the names and titles of the Arbitrators and agents at the Assembly at Geneva, exchange of powers, and presentation of the cases, and then takes up and abjudicates on each case seriatim.
