

The Geneva Arbitration.

The work of the arbitrators was happily closed on Saturday, when the arguments and award in the cases were made public. They have awarded a gross sum of \$15,500,000 gold, to be paid by Great Britain to the United States, in full for all claims by the United States for alleged deprivations done by the cruisers during the war.

The decision of the tribunal is a lengthy document. It begins with a recital of the formal language of the terms of the Treaty of Washington, the names and titles of the Arbitrators and agents at the Assembly at Geneva, exchange of powers, and presentation of the cases, and then takes up and adjudicates on each case *seriatim*.

With regard to the Alabama, it finds that the British Government failed to use due diligence in the performance of its neutral obligations, and notwithstanding the official presentation of the agents of the United States during the construction of the said ship, omitted to take effective measures of prevention, and that the orders of detention which the Government did finally give were issued so late that executing them was not practicable.

With respect to the Florida, they find all the facts that the English failed to take measures adequate to prevent a violation of the neutrality law, notwithstanding the representations of the agents of the United States to Her Majesty's Government, it failed to use diligence to fulfill the duties of neutrality.

The Elections in Manitoba.

Cartier Provided For.

The report that Sir George Cartier was to hide his head in a Manitoba constituency has turned out to be quite correct. The nominations for that Province took place on Saturday, when Riel and Attorney General Clarke retired from the contest in Provencher, and Sir George was returned by acclamation.

Of the other elections in Manitoba we have the following information: In Selkirk, Messrs. A. E. Wilson, Stewart Mubroy, and F. E. Cornish were nominated on the Reform ticket, and Donald A. Smith as a supporter of the Macdonald-Cartier Government.

In Marquette, Mr. Cunningham, editor of the Manitoban, M. Norquay, M. Vertand and Dr. Lynch were nominated; the latter as a Reformer.

SOUTH GREENVILLE ELECTION.—The scrutiny into the voters' lists in South Greenville, was on Saturday brought to an abrupt conclusion, the petitioner and respondent respectively agreeing to withdraw from the contest, preferring to pay their own costs so far incurred, and to try once more the fortune of war, to continuing a struggle vote by vote with uncertain results and at a heavy expenditure to both.

As an illustration of the advantage of railway communication it is mentioned that from the township of Uxbridge and immediate neighborhood about 17000 cords were sold at an advance of \$2 per cord on the price previously obtainable. Here is \$34,000 realized on a single article at one station of the Nipissing railway during one year. This fact is worth a dozen arguments to show how railways benefit the country.


