The Pacific Railway Bill.

In the British House of Commons on Tuesday, the Bill graining the Imperial guarantee of the loan in aid of the construction of the Canada Pacific Railway, was passed through its second reading by a vote of 117 to 15. On the motion being brought up, Sir Charles Dilke denounced the vicious system of guaranteeing enterprises and works for which the tolonies were not yet fit. He insisted that the guarantee for the Bill under consideration was in the nature of a bribe for concessions Canada had made in regard to the fisheries, so that the provisions of the treaty of Washington might be executed. He pronounced the Pacific Railway a gigantic Parliamentary job, and concluded by moving that the second reading of the Bill be postponed six months. Mr. Gladstone said the guarantee had no connection whatever with the Treaty of Washington. Action on the Bill had been purposely delayed until that Treaty was settled. The object of the measure was not to give Canada so much hush-money, but to recognize the just demand she had on England. In the Fenian raids on her territory, Canada had suffered on England's account, and Canada had elected to cancel the debt we owed her in this way.
