## PRESIDENT BARTER, SOCCER MISSIONARY KEEPS WESTERNERS IN THE DARK

The recent missionary tour undertaken by Mr. Fred Barter of Montreal, in connection with the promotion of the Dominion Football Association has come to an end at Winnipeg, and the Western Associations controlling the soccer code are as much in the dark as ever regarding the real intentions of the Federal Body. True it is that Mr. Barter sent a communication to the sport editors of the various western papers who have given prominence to the definite soccer football in the past, but even in that letter he makes no definite announcement regarding any policy which will be followed by the Dominion Football Association. In fact the sum total of the letter is a defence of himself personally against the attacks of the many who are trying to realize the soccer code.

In the early part of 1911 Fred Barter was president of the Quebec Football Association which controlled within its bounds only the clubs of the province in the city of Montreal, and it was at that time that he resigned in order as he himself put it in effect, to have more time to devote to the consolidation of the game all over Canada. With this ostensible purpose in view he went to England and came back with an affiliation with the International Amateur Athletic Union where, quite clear whether he arranged the affiliation with the International Board or with the English Football Association alone, but from the developments which have since occurred it would seem that the former was the body. Immediately on his return the trouble which had already started in Montreal in connection with professionalism, broke out all over Canada, and the meeting which was held between officials of the Amateur Athletic Association and the Dominion Football Association served to further widen the breach between these two bodies.

Outside this, however, the Amateur League will hold sway, and it was pointed out at the time that the Soccerists demanded the right to play against teams from the old country which were not avowedly professional. Montreal had already got well under way with the professionalism arrangement and indeed it was better than the sham amateurism which had been in vogue in the past. The Real Position.

The Dominion Football Association are supposed to have a constitution and rules, and to meet every year in the month of May in general council. The meeting this year is being held in May but as yet no steps have been taken to acquire any of the western members, and so far as they are concerned, there is no Dominion Football Association. It is not clear what whatever can be made in any of the existing rules a general meeting must be held, and at that meeting representatives of all associations, affiliated invited to be present. So far a great deal of talk has been expended in Ontario and Quebec as to the real position.
