It is one of the hardest tasks in the world to adequately express one's feelings when one has lost a dear friend and work mate. Until recently we have been very fortunate in this company as regards casualties, so it was a great shock to us to learn on the 21st that "Chris" had been hit, and his sergeant also. They were on their way to a battery which was being shelled. The shelling died down, so they thought they could get in before it started again, but an unlucky whizzbang landed near them. The boy did not know he was hit, for a small piece of shrapnel went through his heart. Death was in-

stantaneous We laid him to rest in a little military cemetery at Cherisy alongside the gallant boys who fell in taking the "Drocourt line." The sergeant with him died in the casualty clearing station. He was also a splendid boy, out here three years, and waiting for a commission the last six months. How we shall miss the cheery smile, and happy disposition of our old pal. He was a great help to those who came in touch with him and we became very fond of him.
