In the Dining-Room.

FRIDAY, DEC. 11.
 BREAKFAST—Bananas, Graham or brown bread, butter, Sausage, rolls, Light loaf, Lyonnaise potatoes, Coffee.
 LUNCHEON—Lamb cutlets, Cream cheese, Arrow-root bisquit, Gingerbread, Tomato marmalade, Tea.
 DINNER—Scalloped oysters, Potatoes, Roasted Chicken, Baked apple pudding, Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Graham or Brown Bread Brews—Heat three cups of milk in a double boiler, season with one tablespoonful of fresh, sweet butter and one teaspoonful salt. Stir into the milk when near to boiling enough graham bread crumbs to make a porridge as thick as ordinary oatmeal. Cook ten minutes. Serve with whipped butter and brown sugar, or with cream and sugar. Brown bread crumbs may also be used.

Arrow-Root Biscuit—Put into a mixing pan two coffee cups of arrow-root and one of wheat flour. Rub in a small teaspoonful of butter into the flour and one teaspoonful of salt. Stir in gradually a very little milk, just enough to make a stiff dough, flavor it with the grated yellow rind and juice of a lemon and a few gratings of nutmeg. Roll thin and cut with a biscuit cutter; bake in a hot oven and brush each biscuit over with the beaten white of one egg and a quarter of a pound of powdered sugar whipped together.

Roasted Onions—Select large onions of a uniform size; do not remove the outer peeling, but roast them slowly in a bakepan with their "jackets" on. When tender peel them and lay them in a covered dish, steaming hot; heat in a pan, rub into it a teaspoonful of flour and turn in one-half cup of cream. Heat it hot, but do not scorch the butter or let it boil. Add one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter teaspoonful of pepper. Turn this sauce over the onions and serve.

Before the Bar.

Fred Elliott Tried for Shooting His Brother.

The Case Has Been Given to the Jury.

Little Interest Taken in the Leutgeit Trial—Confessed to Stealing \$1,200.

Goderich, Ont., Dec. 16.—The trial of Fred Elliott for shooting his brother Harvey at Bayfield on Nov. 8, took place before Judge Masson yesterday. W. Froudon defended the prisoner, and great interest is shown in the trial, the court room being crowded.

Albert Woods, who lives with deceased and one Dumart on the trip to Varna, where they all had several drinks, gave evidence, which did not materially differ from that given before the coroner and magistrate.

William Cameron testified that he was in King's store. He heard loud talking, and with others went to the outside of the hotel. Woods seemed to be shouting Harvey Elliott. Then Fred Elliott backed away and Harvey followed. He then heard a shot, and saw Harvey fall; did not see who fired the shot.

George Irwin said he was on the opposite side of the road, saw someone throwing off his coat, whom he thought was Harvey Elliott. After about three minutes he started across to the hotel, but stopped half-way in the road when he heard the shot fired. He then turned back again. In cross-examination Irwin stated that he did not see who fired the shot, but saw the revolver in Fred's hands after the shot was fired. In cross-examination he said Harvey was very quarrelsome when intoxicated.

Lily Elliott, sister of prisoner and deceased, stated that Fred came to her that evening and gave her the money from the bar, and told her he was going to walk up and down the platform. Her mother looked on from the door, and then passed out of the back one, and while the witness was entering the cash she heard loud talking, and went to the front, where Harvey was swearing and quarrelling with someone. Witness put her arms around Harvey to try and stop him, but he broke away. She then called for help, and tried to stop the quarrel between her brothers. In cross-examination she stated that Fred was sick, and had been treated for an abscess for a long time. Her evidence generally confirmed that of previous witness.

At the conclusion of Miss Elliott's examination, Mr. Froudon, for defendant, addressed the jury for nearly an hour, and was followed by Mr. Lewis, crown prosecutor.

Judge Masson charged the jury, and they retired about 9 o'clock. **THE LUETGERT TRIAL.** Chicago, Dec. 16.—Public interest in the Luetgeit trial has fallen off greatly. The court room was only half filled when Attorney Harmon resumed his opening address for the defense, at the conclusion of which court adjourned for the day. The jury were driven to the sausage manufactory and spent the afternoon inspecting the cellars and sausage vats.

STOLE \$1,200 AND CONFESSED. Montreal, Dec. 16.—Emanuel Legault, who was arrested at North Bay, Ont., by Detectives Simpson and Coleman on charges of breaking into and stealing \$1,200 worth of clothing and furniture from the residence of Mr. Jas. Walker, charged the jury for nearly an hour, and was followed by Mr. Lewis, crown prosecutor.

CARLOAD OF CRIMINALS. Winnipeg, Dec. 16.—A special car attached to the freight train of the passenger train from the west contained thirteen of the most notorious criminals that have been captured on the coast by the Canadian police during the past few years. Every one was loaded down with ball and chain, securely handcuffed and shackled. They were in charge of four guards from New Westminister penitentiary. 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Spots on the Sun.

You Can See Them Now With Smoked Glass.

The Biggest Measures 100,000 Miles in Diameter—Great Masses of Flames.

New York, Dec. 16.—Prof. Garrett P. Serviss was seen at his observatory at his Brooklyn home and showed the great sun spot area through a telescope.

"These whirling masses are apparently flames," he said, "and, seen through a spectroscopic, would be of a beautiful russet color. They are thousands of miles in height, which will give some idea of the size of the conflagration that is going on there. It is stupendous beyond comprehension. In a few days there will be a magnificent sight. The spots are moving with the sun, and when, by the sun's rotary motion, they reach the edge, which they will do in a few days, these fiery flames, thousands of miles in height, will shoot out over the edge of the sun's disc in magnificent streaks of color."

"I believe that great masses have already been thrown up into the air for thousands of miles, and, falling back, after being partially cooled by their flight through space, have made the great cavities in the sun's surface, and also the black appearance."

One of the spots, the largest on record, has attained a diameter estimated at 100,000 miles and may easily be seen near the center of the sun's glass.
