Foolish Hair-Splitting.

An attempt is being made to have the eleven Liberal petitions against Conservative M. P.s in this Province thrown out, because of an allegation that the papers were lodged with the registrar at Osgoode Hall instead of with another officer. Objection is based on the new Ontario Law Courts Act, which provides for the entry of writs and petitions at what is known as the "Central Office." The Liberals hold that the Dominion Controverted Elections Act will over-ride this technicality, and that even if it does not an order for the transfer of the petitions and deposits to the proper office can be easily obtained. As Lord Chief Justice Russell of England said the other day, foolish technical hair-splitting as to formalities, even if well founded, cannot be permitted to defeat the ends of justice. There are no petitions against the return of Ontario Liberal members-elect.

Topics of Today.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell seems to be disinclined to act as Opposition leader in the Senate at Ottawa. He says he wishes to have no further responsibility. When interviewed by the Toronto World on the subject, the following conversation ensued—Sir Frank Smith being present:
"Will it be likely to succeed you as leader?"
"Oh, Sir Frank Smith, I grieve," the ex-Premier replied, and then, turning to Senator Smith, he added, smilingly, "Isn't that so, Sir Frank?"
Whereupon the latter made answer: "God help the Senate, if it is!"
"Do you intend to retire from active political life?" was the natural query that followed.
Sir Mackenzie—Not much.
Sir Frank (breaking in)—Why, he's only just begun!
Sir Mackenzie (continuing)—No; I've been 30 years in Parliament, but I'm not so old that I intend to quit the fight yet.

They have brown coal in Germany, and the German navy has been commanded to use it.

Premier Laurier says the report that he had recommended Hon. Edward Blake for appointment on the Judicial Committee of the British Privy Council is incorrect. No action has been taken.

Toronto has 25 Presbyterian Churches; Montreal has 21, including four French, one "kirk," the American Presbyterian and its mission.

The High Court of Independent Foresters of New Brunswick has adopted a formal protest against a member of the executive under salary going into politics. This protest arises from the conduct of Mr. McGillivray in the recent Dominion election.

The consumption of horse and mule meat in France continues to increase, and there are now 203 "hippophagic butcheries" in the republic. The London Chronicle's Paris correspondent says that donkey meat is sold as veal in some third-rate restaurants, and that the southern stew known as bouc in Canada is made with horse meat so skillfully disguised that it cannot be detected. Paris must be a splendid place for the man with a brilliant imagination.

KILLED FOUR CHILDREN.

Opelika, Ala., Aug. 7.—A man named Luckabee went to the house of a negro against whom he had a grudge. Taking an axe from the woodpile, he struck four negro children who were there, instantly killing all four.

CANADIANS CONGRATULATED.

London, Aug. 7.—The splendid victory of the Canadian artillery team in capturing the Queen's prize in the Shoburness meeting, following on the capture of the Kolapore cup at Bisleigh, the Glencairn's victory at Oyster Bay and the Queen's Bisleigh prize last year, puts Canada on quite a new plane among sportsmen here. Today one hears such comments as "laurels." The younger generation is knocking at the door, with a vengeance." In camp last night the victory aroused what the Times calls "enthusiasm." Lieut.-Col. Cole and Capt. Myles were chaired round the camp, the band of the Third Kents playing, "See, the Conquering Hero Comes."

The Daily News publishes an article congratulating the Canadian artillery team upon winning the Queen's prize in the Shoburness competition. The article recalls with delight the message of loyalty sent to the British Government by Canada early in the present year, and concludes by declaring that the Queen's prize is in good hands.

The chief Canadian artillery team met a British artillery team yesterday afternoon in the repository competition for the Governor-General of Canada's cup. The British team won with a score of 235 points to 223 to the credit of the Canadians.

LI VISITS VICTORIA.
London, Aug. 7.—When the Chinese envoy was ushered into the presence of the Queen at Osborne House, her Majesty was seated in a small gilded chair, dressed in black, and surrounded by members of the royal family. Lord Salisbury presented Li Hung Chang, and, in response, the Queen bowed to the nation's guest, but did not rise. Li Hung Chang then read a speech in the Chinese language, which his son, Viscount Li, translated. He said, in substance, that he had been commanded by his master, the Emperor of China, to pay his respects to her Majesty, and that he had traveled many miles to carry out this mandate. He then handed to the Queen a large, yellow, silken envelope,

THE SULTAN UNEASY.

Constantinople, Aug. 7.—Confirmation has been received from various sources of the statement that the Russian policy, in regard to Turkey, is undergoing a change, and much uneasiness is felt at Yildiz Palace, and by the Porte in consequence.

TRINIDAD.

London, Aug. 7.—A Lisbon dispatch to the Times says: "The Foreign Office has communicated a note to the newspapers to the effect that Portugal, whose good offices were accepted by England and Brazil, has awarded the Island of Trinidad to Brazil. All of the Lisbon papers praise England's nobility and promptness in accepting the award."

RHODES UNDER FIRE.

Cape Town, Aug. 7.—A war correspondent, returned from Matabeleland, reports that Mr. Cecil Rhodes displayed great courage in the field, while bullets were raining around him. The former premier said he could not see that anything was to be gained by his going into a hot corner, but if he did not do so he would be taunted with cowardice. Therefore, he exposed himself unnecessarily to the mouths of his enemies.

The correspondent declares that the Matabele rebels are surrendering. The fighting now is on a small scale. At Salisbury a famine is feared.

CAPE COLONY AFFAIRS.

Cape Town, Aug. 7.—The Premier of Cape Colony, Sir J. Gordon Spragg, addressing his constituents at East London, said that the Government proposed to attend to the defenses of the country, and construct batteries at Algoa Bay, and in Buffalo Harbour, as a contribution to the empire of which they formed a part.

The Premier also said that, assuming that Cecil Rhodes had acted in connection with the Cape Colony was correct. The question now, Sir John declared, was solely between Great Britain and the Transvaal.

ANOTHER MASSACRE.

London, Aug. 7.—Advices from Heraklion (or Candia), Crete, say the situation is becoming more serious. According to these advices bands of Moslems are breaking into the houses of foreign residents, and the authorities are powerless to prevent the outrages. The Daily News prints a dispatch from Candia, Crete, Aug. 5, saying that a band of 10,000 Moslems forced an entrance into Heraklion and elected all the Christian residents from their houses. A dispatch from Athens, Aug. 6, confirms the report that a massacre has occurred at Heraklion. Hassan Pasha, the Governor, was seriously wounded. The central news also has received advices confirming the report of a massacre and adding that the town of Heraklion was sacked and the Russian vice consul stationed there, seriously maltreated.

Serious fighting is reported from Macedonia. Two hundred insurgents defeated seven legions on three hundred Turkish troops at Sarantopore pass, near Ellassona. Two bodies of insurgents at Kastratira, after two days' fighting, put the Turks, cut their way through towards Sarantopore.

THE GOVERNMENT DEFEAT

May Kill the Land Bill and Curral the Lords' Veto Power.

London, Aug. 7.—Two results may be expected from the defeat sustained by the Government in the House of Lords yesterday on the Irish Land Bill. First, that the bill will be dropped entirely, thus leaving Salisbury and Balfour more discredited than if they had abandoned the bill earlier, as threatened.

The more ulterior consequence probably will be the curtailment of the practical veto powers of the House of Lords, which for a generation at least has been a stumbling-block to all useful legislation.

ROBBED WHILE HIS LEG WAS ASLEEP.
