LI VISITS VICTORIA. London, Aug. 7 .- When the Chinese

envoy was ushered into the presence of the Queen at Osborne House, her Majesty was seated in a small gilded chair, dressed in black, and surrounded by members of the royal family. Lord Salisbury presented Li Hung Chang, and, in response, the Queen powed to the nation's guest, but did not rise. Li Hung Chang then read TENDERS for the purchase of the old Engineer a speech in the Chimese language, which his son, Viscount Li, translatted. He said, in substance, that he as swelled had been commanded by his master, the Emperor of China, to pay his respects to her Majesty, and that he had traveled many miles to carry out this mandate. He then handed to the Queen a large, yellow, silken envelope,

containing his credentials. The Queen, in reply, said that she was glad to see his Excellency, and remarked that he had had a long journey. Her Majesty also said that she reciprocated the goodwill of the Chinese Emperor. The Queen then, for the first time, arose, and remained standing while Li Hung Chang retired from the presence, bowing. Li Hung Chang afterwards boarded the royal yacht Osborne, to be presented to the Princess of Wales, who, kodak in hand, took a photograph of the great Chinaman as he approached the yacht. After taking tea on board the Osborne Li Hung Chang returned to the royal yacht Albert, which then steamed back to Portsmouth through the lines of the fleet. The sailors manned the yards as the yacht passed, and Li Hung Chang did not conceal his admiration of the imposing spectacle, comprising some 47 vessels of the British navy.

London, Aug. 6 .- The members of the House of Lords showed great interest yesterday in the committee stage of the Irish Land Bill. There was 'a larger muster of peers present than was the case with any measure since the Home Rule Bill. In fact, some of from the House that their faces were not familiar to the doorkeepers, and several identifications were rendered necessary. The public and press galleries were packed with people. A notice issued by the Postoffice Department states that some postmasters have fallen into the error of considering letter cards as postcards, and it is therefore necessary to repeat that a letter-card is in no sense a postcard, but a letter, and as such is subject to the ordinary letter postage. Any postmaster, therefore, at whose office a letter-card may be posted or who may receive such a card from another office, showing less prepayment than would be required in the case of a letter, should tax or collect, as the case may be, double the

deficiency of postage, just as in the case of a short paid letter. WANTED HIS COMMISSION.
