

STOOPS TO COMQUER!

Representatives Handled the Tariff.

Separate Measures Passed Placing Coal, Sugar, Iron Ore and Barbed Wire on the Free List-British Comment.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 13 .- At 6:30 'clock tonight the Senate Dariff Bill, unchanged, unamended, unbouched, was passed by the House, and the measure now awaits only the signature of the President or his failure to sign it within ten days to be enacted into a law. It was passed according to the programme arranged yesterday and ratified at a caucus of Democrats this morning. The caucus met at 10 o'cleck and adjourned at noon, with the understanding that the Senate bill and separate measures placing coal, sugar, iron ore and barbed wire on the free lists, should be put through the House before

adjournment today.

A few minutes after 2 the committee on rules reported the special order and the House entered upon one of the greatest days in its history. The special rule was agreed to after a short debate. Then the Senate bill was debated for two hours and after counter accusations by the Republicans and Democrats and severe arraignments of the majority by several of its own members the bill was passed by a vote of 181 to 105. A number of Democrats voted against the bill, while the Populists supported the majority. There was much applause when the troublesome measure was finally out of the way.

Then the separate bills placing coal, iron ore, barbed wire and sugar on the free list were taken up in the order named and passed after a debate of half an hour on each, and what was probably the biggest day in the House, from the standpoint of work accomplished, came to an end. The free coal bill passed-yeas 160, nays

At 8:15 p.m. the House passed the bill placing iron ore on the free list. At 9:15 p.m. the House passed the free parbed wire bill-yeas 187, nays 84. The free sugar bill was passed-yeas 276. nays 11-and the House at 9:15 p.m. ad-

journed till Wednesday next.

BRITISH COMMENT. LONDON, Aug. 14 .- The Daily News, in commenting on the action on the tariff bill says: In yielding to the Senate's obstruction the House only stoops to conquer. The decision was sudden, but a wise one. The prolonged suspense is removed and a measure of certainty is secured. Free wool will be the test by which Americans will judge free trade. In the meantime business will

doubtless revive. The Morning Post says: Surrender to the Senate was better than prolonging a hopeless struggle.

Provisions of the Treaty Just Ratified by the United States Senate. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 13.-The Chinese treaty, which was ratified by the Senate today by a vote of 47 to 20, provides that for a period of ten years the coming-except under conditions specified — of Chinese laborers to the United States shall be absolutely prohibited. This does not apply to the return of any registered Chinese laborer who ha a lawful wife, child or parent in the United States or property here of the value of \$1,000 or By all means see this line. dekts of like amount due him and pending settlement. Every such laborer is required before leaving the United States to deposit

with the collector a full description in writing of his family, property, etc. The right to return must be exercised within one year from the date of leaving. but the right to return may be extended.

for good cause, for one year. This treaty does not affect the right now enjoyed by certain designated Chinese (who are not laborers) to travel or to come to the United States to reside therein. Chinese laborers have the privilege of

transit through the United States. The United States recognizes the right of the Chinese Government to enforce registry regulations similar to those of the United States, against all American laborers, skilled or unskilled in China, whether residing within or without the treaty ports. The United States also agrees to furnish the Chinese Government an annual report of all its citizens, including missionaries, who are in China.

CYCLONE IN OHIO.

GENEVA, O., Aug. 13. - A genuine cyclone struck North Madison early this morning, devastating forests, orchards, buildings, growing crops, etc. The wind struck in near the lake and swept a in its path. Heavy hail accompanied the wind and smashed thousands of windows. All crops in the path of the storm were utterly destroyed by hail and wind together. The storm swept a path about three miles long. The loss will be heavy. No person was seriously injured.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13 .- With reference to recent resolution of the Halifax Board of frade expressive of alarm at Spain's treaty with Sweden and Norway to admit Scandinavian codfish free to Cuba and Porto Rico, Senor Pereira, Spanish Consul-General here, has been in communication with his Government with the result that he has just received a cable communication authorizing him to advise the Government and all interested parties that Spain is prepared to grant Canada the same privilege as those enjoyed by Sweden and Norway in return for equivalent concession on
