THE TRAVELING DAIRY.

Well-Attended Meetings in Lambton County—Interesting Addresses and Interesting Test.

SARNIA, May 16.—The last season's work of the Traveling Dairy had met with such favor in the localities visited, and its work had also been so favorably commented on during the winter, that the ridings that were not visited last year were very anxious to become acquainted with the work of the deputation this season.

The western deputation, managed by Mr. F. B. Linfield, B.S.A., with Mr. James Hume as butter-maker, left Guelph on the morning of April 29, and after a drive for three days and a half, over very heavy roads, reached the first place of meeting, Sarnia, on the River St. Clair, in Lambton county, Mr. Howell, the secretary of the Farmers' Institute, was there to meet the deputation, and has since very kindly devoted his whole time to the work, being present at all the meetings so far, and aiding the deputation in every way possible. Mr. Howell reports that there are quite a few more meetings given to each riding this year than last.

The meetings being closer together, many are afforded an opportunity to come who could not otherwise have attended. Meetings have been held at Sarnia on May 3; Thornhurst, 4th; Chatham, 5th; Wilsport, 8th; Bridgen, 9th; Colbright, 10th; Cornwall, 11th; Bulman's school house, 12th; Collis' Corners, 15th, and at Providence to-day. All these meetings have been well attended, including many ladies, from 1 to 75 being present at each.

Mr. Linfield, in his address, and Mr. Hume, in handling the churn, showed that they are practical men who thoroughly understand their business.

A few samples of whole milk, butter-milk, and skim milk have been brought in to be tested; and quite a few practical facts deduced from the results. As an illustration of the wisdom of understanding something of herds of cows, and becoming acquainted with each individual, the following test of five cows gives food for thought: No. 1, tested 5 per cent. fat; No. 2, 3.2 per cent.; No. 3, 3.3 per cent.; No. 4, 2.6 per cent.; and No. 5, 2.6 per cent. No. 1 and No. 4 each gave the same quantity of milk, and yet No. 1 would give double the quantity of butter in a given time.

The folly of adding fresh cream to cream about to be churned was also illustrated at one of the meetings, when the buttermilk tested 2.6 per cent. fat. Mr. Linfield pressed this point home by saying that all the cream for a churning should be in one vessel 24 hours before it was churned, and under no circumstances should fresh cream be added if loss was to be avoided. Such has been the experience obtained from every test that has been made of buttermilk from cream so treated.

Other meetings are to be held in this riding, namely: Orange Hill, 18th; Oil City, 19th; Bell's school house, 22nd; McKimmon's school house, 23rd; and Dann Center, on the 24th. The deputation will then visit East Lambton.

IN HONOLULU

Matters Mostly in statu Quo—Suspicion Aroused Regarding Great Britain's Designs.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 17.—Honolulu advices to May 10 state that everything was quiet and both sides were confident.

Two items of general discussion are the passage of what the Royalists call the "press gag law" and the law prohibiting the possession of firearms and ammunition.

The announced establishment of the Canadian Pacific now Australian line is considered very significant. The new line is thought to be more than a mere feeder to the Canadian Pacific, and those who claim to know say that the establishment of the steamer service is in line with Great Britain's policy to construct a traveling belt around the world, and that in case annexation is refused by the United States England can with good grace step in and take possession as necessary to the protection of her interests here.

Another view of the case is that the new company is in the field permanently as a competitor of the Oceanic Steamship Company, and intends to make a bid for the mail subsidy now paid the latter company by the New Zealand Government.

The Sunken Steamer Wandrahm.

QUEBEC, May 17.—The steamship Wandrahm is still lying in a critical position on Apple Island. The passengers and baggage were landed at the Grand Trunk Railway wharf to-day. The poor Germans have had a rough time of it since Friday last, and some of them are unwell as a result of the exposure they had to endure. The agents expect that the vessel will yet be floated.
