Toronto, May 11.—Lack of energy characterized the demand for cattle at the city yards today, and there were times when sellers experienced considerable difficulty in the control of the contro able difficulty in securing Tuesday's range of prices, except for prime steers for butcher and export business. As a general proposition the quality of the offerings was of a more attractive character than earlier in the week, though the receipts still included a large percentage of rough and inferior cattle, and these were very draggy. A comparison of the price level with that prevailing on Tuesday will not show any material changes. day will not show any material changes, but there was undoubtedly a much weak-er undertone to the trade in the cattle out there was undoubtedly a future weak-er undertone to the trade in the cattle division. The other departments were featureless, hogs showing no change in quotations, while in the small meats sec-tion the only variations in prices were in export sheep, which were a trifle easier, and in spring lambs, which advanced 50c per cwt. KNOX ANNIVERSARY

Local Presbyterians Will Mark the 400th a Week From Sunday.

The 400th anniversary of the birth of John Knox will be fitly noted in the Presbyterian Churches of this city a week from Sunday. In all special sermons will be preached, and the work of the reformer will be made the subject of appreciatory addresses. Knox was born in Gifford, Haddingtonshire, in 1505, and died in 1572. He became a marked and avowed reformer. In the troublous times following, Knox was betrayed and became a prisoner in France for many months. He was subjected to much cruelty, and when released went to England, where he preached at Berwick and Newcastle His bold utterances got him into trouble. He was offered a bishopric, but refused. In Mary's reign he fled to Geneva, but later went to Scotland, and began his work of reformation. He wrote a vehement attack on political government by women, which set the country ablaze. Mary threw herself into the work of destroying the reformation, while the reformers were guilty of much iconoclasm. At Perth an accommodation was made, and the Protestants formed a bond of coven-ant for their protection. Knox was as conspicuous in political as in religious affairs, and took up his residence in Edinburgh. Queen Mary summoned him to her presence, and in many discussions with her he made plain his views on religion. In 1570, weakened by apoplexy, he still held his pulpit.
