As these matters have scarcely passed the discussion stage in Canada, personal observation of the teaching of these branches and its results cannot but prove helpful to Canadian educationists.

A matter in which all will admit Canada might well imitate England is the care taken over there to guard the school children from fire. The Government requires that all school buildings erected must be fireproof, and have an assembly-room on each flat, so that disasters such as that which occurred at Collinwood, Ohio, a couple of weeks ago, are impossible.
