THE BUDGET. Mr. Fielding has the gift of lucid exposition, and his budget statement is a clear presentation of the state of the national finances.

The current fiscal year is so nearly completed that he is able to estimate approximately the revenue and expenditure. The revenue he places at \$98,500,000; the expenditure at \$77,500,000, yielding the record surplus of \$19,000,000.

The capital expenditure for the year will be heavy—\$23,000,000. Of this amount \$17,750,000 is applied to the great national undertaking, the Transcontinental Railway.

The Dominion budget shows a bigger surplus—\$16,427,167—for the nine months ending March 31, 1907, than any previous twelve months have shown in Canada's history.

SEEKS IN VAIN FOR CASTAWAY

Cruiser Makes Fruitless Search for Sailors on Indefatigable Island.

Acapulco, Mexico, March 17.—Marked by a signal pole erected by a solitary man, the point on the desolate Indefatigable Island at which Frederick Jeffs, an American sailor, made his last unheeded signal for succor from death, has been found by Lieutenant W. R. Gherardi, commanding the Yankton, and his volunteer rescue party recruited from the American battleship fleet in the Pacific.

The signal pole was found by the rescue party alongside of a brackish spring ten miles from the spot where the captain of the Norwegian vessel Alexandria, which was wrecked on Albermarle Island in May, 1907, contrived to exist, with a part of his shipwrecked crew, until relief arrived.

One faint ray of hope remains to the family of the lost sailor—that of his rescue by some passing vessel. But this is so dim that it is scarcely worth harboring.
