As originally constituted the Dominion of Canada was composed of the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick....

They were united under the provisions of an act of the imperial parliament passed in 1867, and commonly cited as "The British North America Act," although its full official designation originally was "An Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, and the Government thereof, and for purposes connected therewith."

This act received the royal assent March 29, 1867, and came into effect by virtue of royal proclamation July 1, 18867. Provision was made in the act for the admission of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, the Northwest Territories and Newfoundaldn into the Dominion. Newfoundland, alone, has not availed itself of this provision.
