CUSTOMS REVENUE
STILL JUMPING

Collections for Month of June Show a Betterment of \$704,967.

Ottawa, Ont., June 30.—Customs revenue is increasing at an astonishing rate. Last year made a new record, but this year promises to leave far behind. During the first three months of the year ending June 30, customs collections have totalled \$10,220,264, which is \$2,543,171 more than collections during the same months of last year. During June collections totalled \$6,767,966, a betterment of \$704,967.

Dominion Day

As originally constituted the Dominion of Canada was composed of the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
They were united under the provisions of an act of the Imperial Parliament passed in 1867, and commonly cited as "The British North America Act," although its full official designation originally was "An Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, and the Government thereof, and for purposes connected therewith."
This act received the royal assent March 29, 1867, and came into effect by virtue of royal proclamation July 1, 1867. Provision was made in the act for the admission of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, the Northwest Territories and Newfoundland into the Dominion. Newfoundland, alone, has not availed itself of this provision.

ASQUITH DINES SOVEREIGN
AND ENTERTAINS WITH PLAYS

London, June 30.—Herbert Henry Asquith, the British prime minister, and Mrs. Asquith tonight gave a dinner to King George and Queen Mary and many distinguished guests at the premier's official residence in Downing street.

A feature of the entertainment that followed the dinner was a performance of the third act of George Bernard Shaw's "John Bull's Other Island," and of James M. Barrie's "The Twelve Pound Look." Granville Park played the principal roles.

STRATHCONA ABOUT TO RESIGN
PRINCE OF WALES COMING

Two Important Announcements Made at the Dominion Day Dinner at London by Connaught and Sir Wilfrid.

London, June 30.—The Duke of Connaught announced at the Dominion Day dinner tonight that the Prince of Wales probably would visit Canada at an early date. The announcement was a surprise to the 600 Canadians of London, who were present, and was loudly applauded.

The duke predicted that the prince "will walk in the footsteps of his father and grandfather."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier announced that Lord Strathcona, high commissioner for Canada, was about to resign.

Hon. A. G. MacKay Thinks Government Will Go to the Country in October.

LIBERAL PARTY IS SOLID

Reciprocity Issue Has Cemented It and the Outlook Was Never Brighter—Mr. MacKay a Busy Man.

Hon. A. G. MacKay spent a short time in the city last evening on his way from Dutton, where he addressed the convention of West Elgin Liberals at that place yesterday afternoon. He is nearing the end of a strenuous two months' campaign throughout Ontario, during which time he has addressed scores of meetings. He has spoken principally on the reciprocity question, although for the past two weeks Mr. MacKay has been dealing with Provincial issues.

Ten candidates had been nominated for the Legislature. This coming week he will attend his own nomination meeting at Owen Sound. Then he will leave for Sault Ste. Marie, and a few days later will go to Port Arthur to address a Liberal meeting, with probably a series throughout the Rainy River District. It is quite possible that he will go through to Edmonton for a brief holiday trip.

"I have been in my office but three days in six months," said Mr. MacKay to The Advertiser. "I have been kept on the move going from one part of the Province to the other. However, I have enjoyed the work very much. I never found the Liberals in better fighting trim. The meetings have been remarkable, in every particular. Everywhere I have been the enthusiasm has been very large, and the enthusiasm most pronounced. The reciprocity question has cemented the party together, and from what I can judge there will be no divisions anywhere. The party is certainly making ground."

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THE LIBERALS OF WEST ELGIN
HAVE TWO STRONG CANDIDATES

Messrs. Donald Macnash and Henry S. McDiarmid Selected to Contest Riding for Legislature and Commons by Big and Enthusiastic Convention.

Dutton, June 30.—At the convention of West Elgin Liberals held this afternoon in this place, Mr. Donald Macnash, ex-M. P. P. Southwold, was unanimously chosen as candidate for the House of Commons, and Mr. Henry S. McDiarmid, of Southwold, was selected to contest the riding for the Legislature. The gathering was the largest held in West Elgin in some years. Hon. A. G. MacKay delivered a very strong address, after which a resolution favoring the reciprocity pact was carried without a dissenting vote.

Not in many years have the Liberals of this riding been in such fighting humor. All the differences that existed formerly have been obliterated, and a united party stands behind the candidates. There is an enthusiasm unknown in the last decade, and

the Liberals enter the fight confident that they can capture the riding.

The convention assembled at two o'clock. Dr. Ling, of Dutton, president of the association, occupying the chair, the hall was completely filled when the meeting opened, every portion of the constituency being represented. When the credentials of the delegates were presented, the convention got down to work, the first business taken up being the nomination of candidates for the House of Commons.

The first name mentioned was that of Mr. William Tolmie, Aldborough, who contested the riding at the last general election.

Mr. Macnash Nominated.

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RUSSIA DISLIKES
SEALING PACT

Questions Right of Canada To Participate in Conference.

LATTER FAVORED BY U.S.

Dominion Not an Owner of the Herds and Should Not Share in Catch.

St. Petersburg, June 30.—The press sharply criticizes the outcome of the Washington Seal Conference, and questions the right of Canada to participate in the conference. It says that Canada, not possessing seal breeding grounds, could be regarded as joint possessor with the United States, only because the latter on the eve of the conference for some reason conceded to the Dominion one-fifth of the American yearly catch.

The paper asserts that the compromise with the Canadian and Japanese poachers, giving them 30 per cent of the Russian catch, is useless, because there is nothing to prevent the poachers of other nations from taking their places. It adds that the conference should have established the principle with Russia, the United States and Japan were the owners of the seal herds which virtually are domesticated animals, the capture of which, in the sea pastures, is as unlawful as the capture of cattle straying across the frontier line.

DEADLY PERIL OF
ALBERTA TOWN

Frank in Grave Danger of Being Buried by Landslide.

FROM TURTLE MOUNTAIN

Government Surveyors Find Mining Operations Are Weakening Base of Hill.

Ottawa, June 30.—That the town of Frank, Alberta, is in grave danger of a landslide with heavy losses, owing to mining operations which have weakened the northwest shoulder of Turtle Mountain, is the gist of a report by Prof. R. W. Brock, director of the geological survey. Turtle Mountain, whose northwest shoulder overlooks Frank, has several mines at its base. Several cracks have already appeared in the huge mass of rock, which are ascribed to the mining operations, and it is considered that further work on the coal seams may lead to awful results.

Frank has already had one landslide, the catastrophe of 1903, and now Turtle Mountain is said to be hanging over it like the sword of Damocles.

The mountain has been under inspection since 1903 by the geological survey. Prof. Brock reports it this year to be in much more dangerous condition than a year ago.

Last year two small cracks were discovered. This summer they are quite marked in development. Moreover, the surface is covered with shingle, so that a fissure might not be evident until it had attained considerable size. The report ends with an urgent warning that any further undermining may result in disaster without the slightest warning.

SERIOUS CHARGE
FOR CHATHAM MAN

Chatham, June 30.—George Learst, who recently served a term for a similar offence, is again charged with taking criminal liberties with a little girl of 12 named Hubbard. Learst was drunk and claimed that he did not know what he was doing. He was remanded till July 6.

WALLACEBURG MAN
SENTENCED FOR THEFT

Chatham, June 30.—Samuel Hamilton, charged with the theft of a watch from David Wilson, of Wallaceburg, was found guilty this morning and sentenced to six months in the Central Prison.

CHOLERA ABOARD.

Triest, Austria, June 29.—A woman passenger on the Austrian steamer Oceania, which arrived here from New York last Sunday, has developed cholera. The other passengers have been detained at the isolation hospital.

The Oceania sailed from New York June 1, and touched at St. Michael's and Naples.

AN OLD STORY.

Berlin, June 3.—Samuel Untermyer, who is here in connection with the Polish litigation, when asked about the grand jury disclosures against the Steel Trust said: "These disclosures are no news to me. On the contrary, they have been allowed to run openly under the eyes of the Government for the last fifteen years. To those who know the situation the sudden discovery of them by the Government officials is amusing."
