

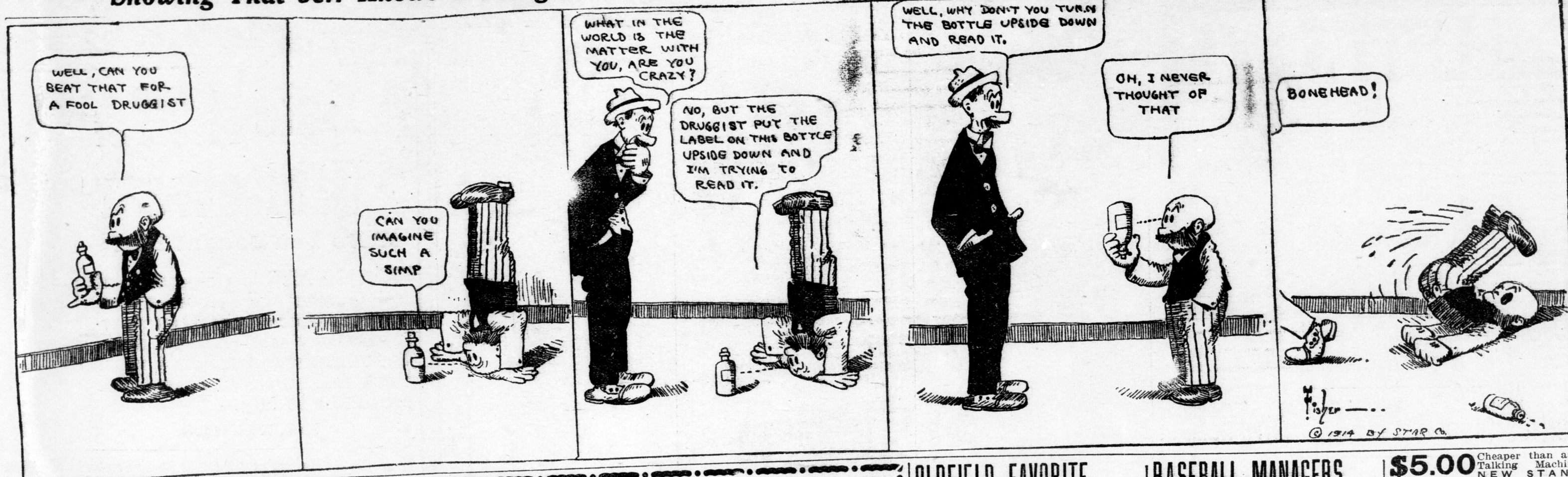

WESTERNS WIN ROUND
BUT SEAFORTH PROTESTS

Local Varsity Team Holds Seaforth to 5 to 5 Score in Latter Town and Wins Round By Four Goals--Three O. H. A. Men On Line-Up.

Seaforth, Feb. 25.—The Western University team of London with three of the O. H. A. intermediates of that city on the line-up succeeded in tying the local Northern League team here tonight, the score being 5 all, and thus winning the round. The game was played under protest, the locals protesting McAvoy and Dot, Reid, who played for the Westerns, claiming they were not eligible under Northern League rules.

Game Was Fast.

The game was a fast one from start to finish. At half time, the score stood 1 to 1, Brodison scoring the first goal of the game in 20 minutes, and in the second half, Seaforth took the lead when Hays scored in 4 minutes and Dick repeated a minute later. Davy Reid, the local boy on the London line-up, then got the first after 11 minutes of play and notched the second one on a pass from Brodison in 14 minutes. The third came after 17 minutes. The Londoners tallied again 3 minutes later, when Davy Reid passed to Schumacker in front of the goal, the latter scoring. Harkirk notched the last 2 goals and put the

teams on even terms again just before full time.

The last part of the contest was played six men a side, Sills getting hurt and the London going off to even up. One of the biggest crowds of the season witnessed the match. DR. YATES NAMED MANAGER
OF HAMILTON'S 1914 TEAM

Former Member of Phillies and Pacific Coast League Teams Will Pilot the Kolts.

Hamilton, Feb. 25.—Dr. R. W. Yates, of Philadelphia, recommended by Connie Mack, manager of the world's champion Athletics, will manage the Hamilton Canadian League Club in 1914. His appointment was made at yesterday afternoon's meeting of the club directors, he being the choice of three other applicants. It was also announced that five young and speedy players had been signed, making prospects exceedingly bright.

Dr. Yates has a record that assures Hamiltonians of his ability to give this city a team that will be up there fighting all the way. He has played in the Pacific Coast League and with the Philadelphia Nationals, and is looked upon as the right man to pilot a B class club. Last year he was finishing his college course and did not play ball at all. He will report here about April 1, or six weeks before the season opens.

BASEBALL MANAGERS
INTRODUCED TO KING

Royal Sportsman Warmly Welcomed to Game by American Players in England.

[Canadian Press.] London, Feb. 26.—Three hearty American cheers and a tiger were the welcome given by the baseball teams to King George on his arrival today on the Chelsea Football Ground to witness the game between the New York Nationals and the Chicago team of the American League. The players were grouped immediately in front of the royal box, and the rattle of the hurrahs evidently immensely pleased the royal sportsman, who repeatedly bowed his acknowledgements.

The King was accompanied by United States Ambassador Page and a full staff of the embassy, as well as a large suite of court officials.

The ambassador introduced Charles A. Comiskey, John J. McGraw, Jos. Farrell and James J. Callahan, with all of whom the King shook hands.

Five or six thousand spectators attended the game. All branches of British sports were largely represented. Many of the leading cricket and football players were on the ground taking keen notice of all the points of the game.

The Earl of Londsdale and Baron Desborough both of whom are prominent in sporting circles were among the many titled personages surrounding the King.

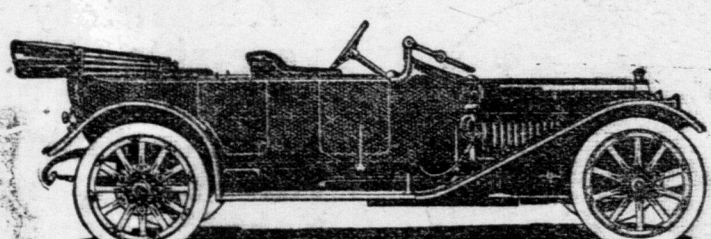
