#### TWO MONTHS BEFORE **CORRECT POPULATION** FIGURES AVAILABLE

Revisions Will Require Considerable Time On Part of Government Enumerators.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.—Canadian Press.—An official estimate as to the result of Canada's "counting of noses" in the Dominion 1921 census, will not be available before the middle of October, it is intimated by officials of the census department. While some figures as to certain cities and towns issued there are subject to revision on account of closed houses and absentees, and they may be changed considerably when the final official figures are available. Census returns are stated to have been coming in very well all along, but there are outlying sections where the work of counting the population was expected to take weeks or even months, inasmuch as it was necessary to equip the enumerators with canoes, dog sleds and even seagoing tugs in order that they could check up all the inhabitants of the sparsely settled frontiers.

In the meantime, as fast as the returns reach Ottawa, they are carefully checked over by clerks and officials, and every attempt is being made to announce the final population figures at
