HOPES OF IRISH PEACE WANE AT BRITISH CAPITAL

Pessimism Prevails As Collins
Brings De Valera's Reply
From Dublin.

FEAR RUPTURE IN PARLEY

Lloyd George Believes Mes-
sage to Pope Constitutes
Grave Challenge.

London, Oct. 24.—Michael Collins, "minister of finance" in the Dail Eireann government, who went to Dublin on Saturday, returned here last night. It was understood that Premier Lloyd George had laid before the Sinn Fein delegates certain questions affecting allegiance to the British crown and there was a belief that Mr. Collins had gone to Dublin to talk the situation over with his colleagues.

It was supposed he brought a communication from Eamon De Valera and it was felt that upon this answer and the attitude taken by the Dail Eireann delegates would depend the continuance of the negotiations.

At Sinn Fein headquarters here, the attitude of hopefulness which has prevailed since the return of Mr. Collins, was expressed that insistence upon a declaration of allegiance to the King by Lloyd George would result in the breaking off of the negotiations.

Substitutes Formula.
It was pointed out, on behalf of the Sinn Fein, that this condition was that published by the Dail Eireann and that there was substituted for it the formula of "association with the British Empire." The Sinn Fein, it was declared, is willing to continue the conference according to that formula, but will not accept allegiance to the King, at least until the baronetcy is finally made.

At the British office this forenoon it was stated that allegiance to the King was a necessary consequence to coming into the British Empire, and except on the basis of Ireland remaining in the Empire no conference was possible.

The Sinn Fein spokesmen, it was declared, were prepared to meet Mr. Lloyd George's demand for a declaration of allegiance with a determined refusal.

Grave anxiety over the possibility of negotiations between the British Government and Sinn Fein Ireland continuing to a successful conclusion was felt everywhere here today.

Conference Resumed.
The conference between members of the British cabinet and representatives of the Dail Eireann was resumed, but there was evident a feeling that the situation was such as to give ground for concern among those hopeful for an adjustment of the Irish controversy.

Everywhere, except in the conference, there was hope that the conference would continue with expressed this morning, and it was argued that, with good will on each side, a way out of the difficulty created by Mr. De Valera's message to Pope Benedict could be found.

At the same time it was contended that the Sinn Fein representatives were hardly doped their leader, and that the possibility of seeing how a rupture of the conference was avoidable.

Belief Assures Full Field of Candidates.
Quebec, Oct. 23.—(Canadian Press).—Hon. L. G. Belley, postmaster-general, addressing a meeting of the supporters of the present government in this city and district here on Saturday night, which had been called to lay the foundations of a campaign organization, Mr. Belley outlined the progress which had been taken up to the present and expressed the opinion that there would be a candidate in practically every constituency under his direction within the next fortnight.

Favors Referendum.
The London Times today earnestly reiterated its desire for an Irish settlement. It urged that, even if an agreement in the conference was not possible, a complete referendum should be held. In support of its argument, the newspaper favored a referendum in the southwestern Ireland on the question of allegiance to Great Britain.

The deepest anxiety is felt everywhere in Ireland regarding the prospects of today's fateful meeting of the conference on the Irish question. No disposition is evidenced by Mr. Valera's telegrams to comment on the appearance of the pope, although it appears from the fact that he has been seen by the Catholic press also refrains from commenting upon the appearance of the pope.

Premier Lloyd George, answering a question in the House of Commons today regarding Eamon De Valera's message to Pope Benedict, said the publication of Mr. De Valera's message, particularly in the middle of the peace negotiations, constituted a grave challenge.

"The position of the Government on the question involved in that telegram has been made abundantly clear," the premier continued. "We do not propose to recede from it, and any conference cannot proceed on any other basis."

BRITAIN SUFFERS FROM TEMPESTS

London, Oct. 24.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Week-end reports have brought definite signs that the record of eight months of summer weather has been broken up by tempestuous conditions, which are reported from all parts of England, while snow fell in Scotland. A number of minor wrecks are recorded along the coast.

LENINE MAY DECLARE WIDESPREAD AMNESTY

Riga, Oct. 24.—Thousands of political prisoners, including 150,000 reported by soviet sources to be imprisoned in Russia, may be released within a few weeks in connection with a widespread amnesty said to be in contemplation by Premier Lenin on the occasion of the fourth anniversary of the soviet revolution.

Bolshevik circles in Riga today reported that a general amnesty was under consideration, but that details were still uncertain.

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
