

Brazilian Rebels Reported Fleeing Along Wide Front With Federals In Pursuit

REVOLT IN BRAZIL NEARING AN END

Rebels Are Dislodged From Nearly All Stronghold Positions.

GUNS CAPTURED

Associated Press Despatch.
New York, July 28.—The revolutionary outbreaks in Sao Paulo, Brazil, have been brought to a conclusion with a victory for the government, according to information from authentic sources received by a cable company here today. Conditions in Sao Paulo are reported as rapidly returning to normal.

Rio Janeiro, July 28.—A communique issued by the government early today concerning the situation growing out of the revolt at Sao Paulo says: "The legal troops continue dislodging the rebels from their positions. They (the rebels) are retreating all along the front. We have captured rifles, machine guns and munitions, also a considerable number of persons, who all declare that discouragement prevails among the rebels, who show exhaustion resulting from the efforts made during the last few days."

"We captured the offices of the north station and a train composed of a locomotive and railway car equipped with machine guns and a mountain gun. Our artillery effected appreciable progress in concentrating fire upon convenient zones."

"Above everything, the most notable fact is the advance obtained by the legal forces between yesterday and today."

The north station mentioned in the official communique is the terminus of the Central Brazilian Railway. It is situated in the northeast section of Sao Paulo about a dozen blocks north of the Moina section, which the federal troops were reported to have reached the day previous.

LOVE'S COURAGE SAID SUPREME

Rev. A. Mann, of Scotland, Speaks at First Congregational Church.

Speaking from John 3, on "Love's Courage," in the First Congregational Church, Sunday evening, Rev. Andrew Mann of Scotland, whose outstanding characters portraying the courage love upholds—Joseph and Nicodemus.

"How utterly dismayed and panic-stricken the disciples of Jesus must have been when they beheld his body on the cross," the speaker said, "it never occurred to them that He could possibly die on the cross."

"They just as you and I—might have said, as the others said, 'thou be the Christ, come down and save thyself.' But what do they do, instead? They all fled in dismay—dismay which, indeed, is the reason and leaves a man crumpled and helpless. Some men found the Christ at the cradle, some at the temple, some by the sea, and some by the cross."

"The two secret disciples, Joseph and Nicodemus, men prominent in the city and highly esteemed. These two, who, indeed, were the reason for the body. They could not explain why, but they knew He was the Christ. They found Him at the cross. He showed himself an honest Roman when he granted their request for the body of Christ."

"Sometimes one thinks this a strange fact, that these two men should alone be the men to tenderly take down and carry to the garden the body of the Lord. But that is found so often in life. The most unlikely man is the one who performs the necessary work."

"Love must always act. It cannot stay buried. The hearts of these two men were moved by their reason. 'True love always finds its own. Sometimes sorrow leads us to the man of sorrows. In our prosperity or popularity we may fail to see Him, but somehow, sometimes, somewhere, meet Him we must.'"

"So, because love showed them the way, these two men, who until crucifixion had been secret followers, now, bravely in the face of all dangers, openly declare their loyalty to Him."

"It's at the cross," concluded Rev. Mann, "that a man's biggest, best, noblest nature is brought to the surface and his true courage and heroism is shown."

BUSINESS CONDITIONS REPORTED IMPROVED

Confidence Supreme According to Bell Company Monthly Report.

Somewhat improved business conditions are noted in some circles, according to the monthly survey of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, which has just been issued. Construction by R. Eddy Company, of Hull of a new sulphite mill, which will cost between two and three million dollars and will employ 500 people, is reported. Steel producers at Hamilton are a little more active. WALLET CONTAINING \$100 STOLEN FROM 'GAS' STATION

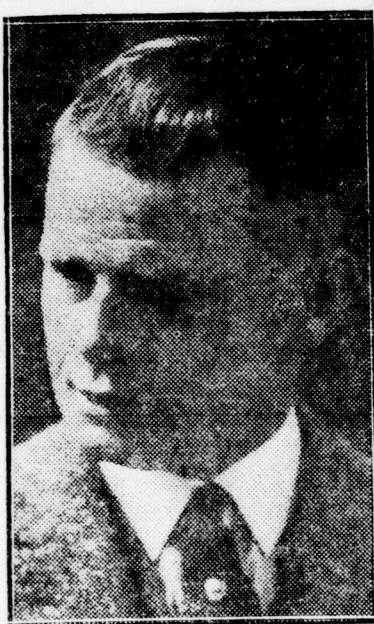

Magistrate Gladman took a lenient view of the case of John Davis, a young Englishman of 23, who being without funds, stole a diamond ring and \$2.25 from Albert Clark, a fellow countryman who had befriended him.

The magistrate found Davis guilty of theft a week ago and when he came up for sentence this morning, sent him to jail for ten days.

"Why did you do it?" asked the court.

"Because the man told me to get out and I didn't know where to get my next meal," stated Davis.

"What are you going to do when you get out?" further inquired Mr. Gladman.

"If you had applied to the proper authorities in the first place, you would have received assistance," declared the court.

"I did apply to the city," said Davis.

He was sent by the city to St. George's Society. "Informed Crown Attorney Albert M. Judd, and he abused their confidence."

"I am going to give you as light a sentence as possible, under the circumstances," said Mr. Gladman, in imposing sentence.

Davis pawned the ring for 50 cents with a local pawnbroker. He was arrested a week ago Saturday by Detective Bolton.

SUFFERING BROKEN BACK,

Russia Faces Sugar Famine

Moscow, July 28.—Soviet Russia is confronted with another famine, in the form of an acute sugar shortage, due to the failure of the beet root crop in Ukraine. Seven of the largest factories in the Kiev and Kurek districts have been forced to suspend work owing to lack of raw material.

TOURISTS ARE UNABLE TO GET SUNDAY FOOD

Complaints Heard on Situation at Present at Wonderland Camp.

Complaint that they are unable to purchase food supplies on Sunday is heard from many American tourists who make the Wonderland Tourist Camp their headquarters while stopping in London. Many tourists arriving late Saturday night or early Sunday morning from Detroit or Buffalo, make their way to the tourist camp. They are keen on outdoor lunches.

Yesterday it was pointed out to many of the tourists that they could buy plenty at local restaurants, but this did not appeal to them. They want to get supplies which they do not have to consume on the premises, but which they could take to the tourist camp.

"We get all sorts of compliments from patrons of the tourist camp," General Manager of the Public Utilities Commission Buchanan stated today, "but they have just that one complaint. They come into a strange country, unacquainted with the Lord's Day Alliance act, and are caught unaware without eatables."

Asked if a grocery at the tourist camp would settle the problem, the utilities manager commented that it would be made to pay. This was doubtful, though not impossible.

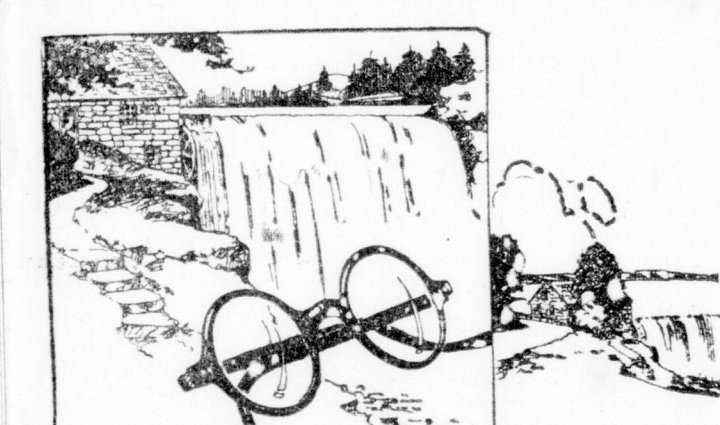
